THE EARLY HISTORY OF SCOTTSDALE CORVETTE CLUB

Part I. The Original Undocumented Scottsdale Corvette Club

The Scottsdale Corvette Club was started by Jeff Thomas in 1996. Jeff put a lot of time, effort and money into establishing the club. The focus was that of a non-traditional club and, as a consequence, there were no dues, organizational structure or organized events. He had a list of members, which included everybody that had ever attended a meeting and taken the time to complete an application.

Jeff Thomas, the originator of the Scottsdale Corvette Club concept, was a very unique individual. His motivating drive was to live Corvettes twenty-four hours a day and he felt that his followers should do the same. He would bring boxes and boxes of literature to each meeting, and often he would have people bring in Corvette parts and put on miniseminars. We would also have drawings for door prizes that he had purchased. His enthusiasm for Corvettes was unending. His short-comings were that he lacked organization and delegation. He would announce what we were going to do but delegate no one to follow up and make it happen.

I first became aware of the Scottsdale Corvette Club through a series of classified advertisements appearing in the Arizona Republic under the automobile classifications. I had always kept a close eye on the ads looking for good deals on cars or parts, especially Corvettes. The ads promoted the Corvette Club meetings which were being held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month. I never paid too much attention to them as we had sort of burned out on the Corvette club scene in 1990 and had not been active for a few years.

One evening Dorinne and I had gone out to Garcia's Mexican Restaurant for dinner, and I heard the sound of auto racing coming from one of the secluded rooms. Being curious, I stuck my head around the corner where I saw a TV set up and a VCR tape was being played of the Corvette autocross from the annual Corvette gathering that occurred over the 1998 Labor Day weekend. As I was peering at the TV, Jeff Thomas approached, and when he found out that we had a Corvette he invited us to join in the meeting. Since we had already ordered our meal, we elected not to join them that evening.

I continued seeing his ads in the *Republic* and finally decided to check out the meeting on the first Tuesday of May, 1999. At this meeting, I met Dick Kulczycki, a long-time Corvette owner and learned that we both were driving 1994 convertibles. The meeting was at Sam's Café on Scottsdale Road just south of Shea Blvd. They had great chicken caesar

salad, and we had a great time talking about Corvettes. It turned out that Dick had participated in the pre-race activities for the Indy Car Series Race in April at Phoenix International Raceway where Corvettes from the area were organized to do a lap or two around the raceway.

When I attended my second meeting with Dorinne, Mark Shaw showed up driving "our" 1972 Corvette convertible that we had owned from early 1973 through October of 1995, also his first time to attend a meeting.

We continued to attend some meetings and participated in a few out-of-town trips. Our first trip was led by a couple who never became members of the "Documented Club." It was memorable because we went to Jerome by way of Yarnell Hill, a great drive, but our leaders stopped in Yarnell and took a side trip to the Stations of the Cross. After what seemed like a long time, they returned to continue on to Jerome. It seems that the couple leading was shopping for a house in Jerome and again disappeared, never to surface again. After waiting for quite a while, a group of us decided we had been in Jerome long enough and decided to return home to the Valley on our own.

We participated in a few trips including the Natural Bridge and Canyon Lake. The last and most important "trip" that we participated in was an expedition to Biosphere II scheduled for the Saturday after the 3rd Thursday night meeting. Dorinne was otherwise occupied, so I convinced my son to go along with me. We arrived at the meeting place in Ahwatukee at the appointed time to find Terry and Mary Turley waiting. The announced departure time arrived, and no one else was in sight. We waited for several minutes for others to show up, but after about half an hour, we decided that we represented the group that day. We discussed whether we should go or not and came to the conclusion "WHY NOT." With that we were off with Terry leading the way in his 1998 Silver Bullet.

We decided to travel the off-freeway route through Florence and Coolidge. It was at this point we experienced the first of Terry's "U-TURN" specials. My son recognized that we had made a wrong turn, and I had to get Terry's attention by flashing my lights and getting him to stop. This was pre-radio days and a precursor to the Club's adoption of the radios that we use to this day.

The main subject of conversation on the big trip to Biosphere II was the need for planning and organization since so many of Jeff's plans went astray. Both Terry and I agreed that if the Club was to succeed it would need some organization and structure. The only problem was how to get through to Jeff what was so badly needed.

together a proposal to present to the Chevrolet dealers in the area. Since we were the Scottsdale Corvette Club, it was felt that our first choices would be a Scottsdale automotive dealer. At the time there were two Chevrolet dealers in Scottsdale. Dick Kulczycki and I volunteered to make the presentations to the dealers on our list.

After careful consideration of the responses to our proposals for sponsorship, we selected Chuck Mullins and Van Chevrolet as the dealer that most closely matched our expectations for the promotion of America's oldest and true sports car and Chuck's ideas and plans for the future growth of Corvette sales and exposure of the Club.

Our official sponsorship agreement with Van Chevrolet started effective May 1, 2001, and Van's Corvette sales and the Club have grown each year.

Events

- 1. Try to attend as many Club meetings and events as possible. Be sure to wear your name tags to Club meetings to help your fellow Club members recognize you.
- 2. If you have signed up for an event, and can't make it, please contact the event organizer as soon as possible. This is particularly critical when reservations have been made at restaurants, hotels, etc., and includes the monthly dinner meeting. If the club incurs any charges due to last minute cancelations, then the canceling member is responsible to reimburse the club for said charges.
- 3. There may be a small charge per member for some events (house parties, holiday party, etc.). These charges are non-refundable for last minute cancellations. The charge has likely been allocated towards food, refreshments, host expense, etc.
- 4. Beginning with the Board, we ask that all Club members provide a welcoming environment to new members.
- 5. Club members are encouraged to contribute their thoughts/ideas on current or future meetings and events.

Email

- 1. Club members are sensitive to the number of emails they receive. For this reason the club email list is maintained exclusively by the Membership Director and should not be used for commercial or political purposes.
- 2. Mass email communication to <u>all</u> members is restricted to the President, Membership Director, Newsletter Editor, and Activities Director. If a member believes they have information relevant to all club members, please send it first to one of the above board members and they will decide whether it should be shared with the entire club. This does not restrict email communications between individual club members.
- 3. The co-chairs of the Vette Vixens maintain a separate list, but the above rules would still apply

Membership/Dues/Board Elections

1. To retain membership you must own a Corvette automobile at some point during any of the twelve month periods of membership.

- 2. Membership renewals are processed in October of each year. You will receive an email notification, well in advance of the due date, and appreciate a quick response. The National Council of Corvette Clubs charges a penalty for late renewal. The cost for late renewals will be passed on to the member.
- 3. Board elections are held during the November dinner meeting, or electronically prior to the meeting if required due to the number of candidates. Official notification of the upcoming election will be communicated no later than mid-October. Opportunities to apply for a Board position will be presented well in advance, and no later than the September Dinner Meeting.

Rules of the Road (Caravans)


- 1. Seatbelts will be worn at all times.
- 2. All participants are encouraged to have 2-way radios.
- 3. All cars will keep a reasonable space between them.
- 4. Keep the car behind you in sight.
- 5. Make every effort to drive in the right lane on highways.
- 6. Obey all speed signs and traffic signs.
- 7. To expedite turns, double up for double left turn lanes. To expedite moving the caravan through stoplights, double up at the intersection on four lane roads. Return to single file after turn or stoplight.
- 8. Regroup after several stop lights or stop signs.
- 9. When parking, back in if at all possible.
- 10. Do not pass other club cars unless for safety reasons, or as instructed by the caravan leader or another member.





SCC ARTICLE APRIL 2014, CLUB MEMBERSHIP SURVEY SUMMARY

The Board would like to again thank the members (approx. 50) who participated in our recent annual Club satisfaction survey. Our Club has hosted the survey over the past five years and the ratings continue to reflect a high rate of satisfaction from our members. Below you will find a full summary of the ratings on the individual survey questions over the past years. In addition many members provided valuable comments to help guide the Board as it continues to develop content and activities (just too many to publish).

You will notice that the ratings have not varied much over the past years, other than the "food category" which reflects some improvement. The Board will continue to work with the management staff at Gainey Ranch to reach high levels of satisfaction. It is worth repeating that the Club has spent many years exploring and experimenting with various venues for our dinner meetings. And, to date, Gainey Ranch continues to be our most desirable choice, based on our criteria.

The Board established 10 basic criteria for a monthly meeting venue:

- 1. Reasonably nice facility and amenities
- 2. Good parking where our members are comfortable with the safety of their cars
- 3. Central Scottsdale location
- 4. Private room without competing noise or distractions
- 5. Separate checks
- 6. Reasonable pricing
- 7. Reasonable quality of food
- 8. Satisfactory service from mgmt and staff
- 9. Efficient ordering and payment processes
- 10. Facility must be able to accommodate varying guest attendance from 25 to 65 guests

We have not been able to come close to replicating the benefits of using the Gainey Ranch Country Club. Getting a private room, timely service, separate checks, efficient payment system, and satisfactory food (yet not outstanding), and at a reasonable price has worked extremely well.

Based on multiple comments about our monthly dinner meetings, the Board has decided to modify the meeting schedule to begin at 6:00 pm (instead of 6:30), to allow those members who wish to enjoy a full hour for cocktails and visiting prior to our 7:00 pm dinner.

Although "house parties" are popular with our members, we haven't had enough volunteers to host. So if anyone has an interest in hosting, please let a Board member know!

The Board will continue to review and incorporate other member's ideas whenever possible.

He told her that if we couldn't decide on a name among ourselves, he would pick a name for the group. The pressure was on! A number of names were suggested and bandied about. We voted and chose the name "Vette Vixens." I must admit I didn't personally like the name much at first, but it has grown on me over the years and now it seems like a natural moniker for the group.

When Mary left the Club, Donna Reagan took over the leadership role, and we went to many great places. When Donna got too busy with her political commitments, both for her family and her own, I took over the leadership role. It was one I relished because I love to eat out, and I read all the local news and reviews on restaurants. When Jim and I moved to Wickenburg, Dorothy Durby took over the reins and she has done an admirable job of keeping us up to date on the latest restaurants.

Men's Poker Night-Come Join US

For years, the female members of our Club (the Vette Vixen's) have gone to dinner (or an occasional lunch) on the third Wednesday of each month. About a year and half ago, the guys decided to take this opportunity and begin a Poker Night, hosted by one of the members. The hosting member provides the food and beverages, and each person attending contributes \$5 to cover the cost of the host. After a short discussion, the cards and chips are counted and then the cards fly! Chips are valued at \$.25 and the initial buy-in is \$10. For those of you who may not know much about Poker, there are many different games that can be played, with each player getting anywhere from 5 to as many as 9 cards (some of which may be common to all players) and the idea is to make the best 5 card hand that one can. In order of priority (or the hand that beats other hands), the hands that can be made are as follows:

5 of a kind (only with a wild card)

Straight Flush (e.g. 5-6-7-8-9) of same suit

4 of a kind

Full House (e.g 3 sevens, and two 5's)

Flush (any 5 cards of one suit)

Straight (e.g 4-5-6-7-8) cards may be of different suits

3 of a kind (e.g. 3 Aces)

2 pair (e.g. 2 eights and 2 nines)

1 pair 9 (e.g. pair of Kings)

In a game of seven card stud, the player receives two cards face down and their third card face up. Whoever has the highest card on board makes the initial decision to check (no bet) or bet (we limit the bet to not more than 4 chips). Subsequent players then decide to call the bet, raise the bet, or fold. The fourth, fifth and six cards are dealt face up and the process continues as outlined above. If there are still people playing, the last card is dealt down, another round of betting takes place and a winner is determined. An offshoot of this game is called "Chicago", where the high hand splits the pot with the person who may have the high or low spade face down, which is specified before the deal. The idea behind this game is to keep people from folding with the idea that they may win half the pot by catching the high or low spade.

Other games played include 5 card Stud; 5 card Draw; 7 Card Stud; Chicago (as described above); 7 Card Roll your Own; Wild Card games where the wild card is specified before the deal, (e.g. deuces wild); Texas Hold'em; Omaha, Crazy Pineapple, and a whole lot more. Of course, Poker is a zero sum game which means that if there are winners, there may be one or more losers. Win or lose, just ask the folks who play, everyone considers themselves a winner because we have lots of laughs and a great deal of fun. Even if you haven't played before, this is a friendly game where we help you learn and even assist you so that you don't decide to play losing hands. It truly is a fun night and we encourage you to join us at one of our upcoming Poker Nights.
