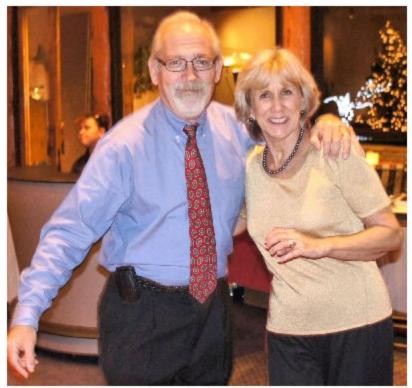

OH, NOOO! DBS! By Mark Bales

Last week I decided to clean up my Corvette and install a Christmas present. That's when it hit. The dreaded "DBS" I had read about on corvette-forum.com. My Grand Sport is only eight months old, with 8700 miles. How could "DBS" happen to me!?

You are asking, "What is DBS?" It is an affliction that has plagued several thousand Corvette C6's since 2005. Dead Battery Syndrome. It began with the requirement that 2005 manual transmission cars had to be parked with the gear shift in reverse, or the battery would drain. No, not a quality issue. GM built them that way. Most new owners didn't pay attention to the owner's manual.

Late in the '05 production run, GM upgraded the software, and manual transmissions were no longer required to be parked in reverse. I had a 2006 six speed, and never had a problem, although my battery lasted less than two years. Didn't think much about it. Living in Arizona, batteries are usually toast after two or three years.

So, less than a year old, with only 8700 miles on the clock, how could I have DBS? I decided to scour corvetteforum.com for the answer. And what did I find out? No one is really sure. It happens less frequently than with the 2005 manual tranny car, but at a rate much higher than your average daily driver. The C6 is a battery eater. Even GM knows it. For 2011 they offered a "battery protection package," a built in battery tender.

All was not lost. I did learn a few things, and the possible culprit that killed my battery. For example, I mentioned "daily driver." For many of us, the Corvette is a second car used primarily for pleasure. Mine might sit in the garage for four to five days. While it's sitting there, it is drawing from the battery. Estimates and some tests indicate a draw of 11 to 50 milliamps, which is considered normal. Lots of little electronic gizmos continue even when car is

off. However, some owners are seeing spikes of 80 to 125 milliamps. At 80 milliamps you lose 2 amp hours of capacity from the battery every day.

I also learned that if the car sits for over a week, it takes thirty minutes of run time to replace the energy lost sitting and starting. Even frequent but short trips will speed the battery to an early death. If a battery isn't fully charged between cycles, it sulfates, negatively affecting the performance and longevity. In addition, the C6 battery is small compared to most car/SUV batteries. GM engineers admit that if the C6 is not driven in one to four weeks, the battery life is substantially diminished (or dead!).

Likely the above contributed to my battery's early demise, but also found what may be an additional cause. My M2W. For those of you who aren't familiar with the NPP option offered beginning with the 2008, it is a dual mode exhaust. Computer controlled butterflies open at 3500 RPM reducing back pressure, giving more growl and 6 HP. An ingenious basement inventor came up with a switch allowing the flaps to be opened at any RPM. You can drive around all day, loud! It is referred to as the Mild 2Wild control.

I learned that if you leave the M2W in the "closed" position, it draws more current from the battery. You may ask, "But if the factory setting is closed, why the drain?" Apparently the M2W intervenes and must force the flaps to stay closed. When left "open" at rest, no drain.

In summary, the dreaded Dead Battery Syndrome is still somewhat of a mystery to C6 owners; however a few things are clear: Short, infrequent trips will lead to an early demise, and if you have M2W, leave the exhausts in the "open" position when you park your baby for more than a few days.

Oh, one more thing... A battery tender. If GM is offering as an option, they must know something. I bought one!

WALTER'S HIGH PERFORMANCE DRIVING EXPERIENCE AT BONDURANT

Story from Interview of Walter by Dorinne Dobson Photos by Mark Bales and Michael Bulfer

We sat down with Walter and Michele Juessen the other day. I wanted to hear all about Walter's experience at the Bondurant High Performance Driving School (pictured above). As most of you know, Walter and Michele purchased a 2010 ZR1 last year, and as part of the purchase, GM treats the new owner/driver to a two-day driving course at Bondurant. Walter wanted to see what the car was capable of doing, and looked forward to finding out using Bondurant's ZR1 instead of his own. He says the folks at Bondurant really put him through the paces. In Walter's class there were: 1 Z06, 2 ZR1s, 2 or 3 regular Corvettes, and several Cadillacs for limousine drivers and others who were more interested in how to drive safely than in performance driving.

The first round of driving was a "thrill ride" in a van around the course to show the participants the basic layout of the course. Walter thought the instructor was showing off his own driving skills, while trying to show the students what you can do in a vehicle if you know what you're doing and you know your vehicle. Walter says he would never drive a van that way.

Walter drove the Cyber gray ZR1 you'll see in the photos. The other ZR1 driver in the class was a 24-year-old girl, who Walter thought would be no competition. In a lead-and-follow exercise, Walter and the other ZR1 followed the pace car around the track. During the round where the girl was behind the pace car and Walter was behind her, Walter was surpri-

Walter's Bondurant Driving Experience

This is the van where Walter got his thrill ride sed to find he had trouble keeping up with her. When they reversed positions with Walter first behind the pace car and the girl following, she was right on his bumper all the way. Walter concluded that the girl was a better driver than he anticipated.



They then started with a simple slalom to get the feel of the car, with instruction in line techniques (how to take turns) and heel-toe down shifting.

In one exercise the one-lane road split into three lanes with three signal lights, all green. The car is traveling at 60-70 mph, and the driver does not know which light is going to turn red. If the right light turns, the driver must make a split-second right turn and immediately stop.

The skid control session was conducted in a Cadillac CTS with "training wheels" (see photo below). Walter says you would not need these maneuvers in a Corvette - the Corvette could handle it quite nicely without the training wheels.



During emergency change of lane situations, some cars made 360 degree turns to avoid the catastrophe. Walter did the straight line emergency stop, traveling 60-70 mph, with no skidding or sliding - stopped it on a dime.

Walter managed to win the autocross, beating the 24-year-old girl by one-tenth of a second, with the others farther back by as much as a second and a half.

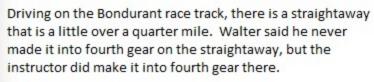

comes up that allows the driver to select from five modes (Wet, Dry, Sport with Active Handling, Sport without Active Handling, Race) that optimize power delivery for specific conditions. Walter tried "wet" first. He put it into first gear, kept the clutch depressed, hit the throttle to 6000+ rpm, then back to 4000 rpm, immediately released clutch, shifted to 2nd and the car went like a rocket. For racing launch control gives you a nice fast start.



Walter says the two-day course was grueling. He was learning and driving from 8:30 to noon and from 1:30 to 5:00 both days. The first day he felt cautious - it was not his car. But he found that the car can take a lot of punishment. He learned a lot, and he never had the feeling of being unsafe or that he had done something stupid. Both instructors he had were very professional and made the classes fun and interesting.

When we asked him if he thought he was a better driver now, Walter said he definitely learned some things to make him a better driver. He said you really feel the raw power and what the car can do, and it's their car! Contents

CROOKED LETTER, CROOKED LETTER By Tom Franklin

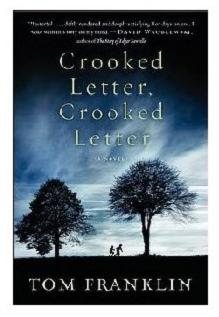
When you were a kid, do you remember spelling Mississippi this way: M-I crooked letter, crooked letter I crooked letter, crooked letter I hump-back, hump-back I? Well, in the front piece of this book, it is inscribed, "How southern children are taught to spell Mississippi." Having been born and raised in Iowa, I'm not sure this statement is true, but it nevertheless makes an interesting premise for this novel that takes place in rural Mississippi.

In the late 1970's, Larry Ott and Silas Jones were boyhood pals. Their worlds were as different as night and day: Larry, the child of lower-middle-class white parents, and Silas, the son of a poor, single black mother. Yet for a few months the boys stepped outside of their circumstances and shared a special bond. Not only were their circumstances different, however. Larry was a book-loving, asthmatic kid who knew a lot about snakes and nothing about sports, while Silas was a star athlete. Tragedy struck when Larry, on the only date he ever had, took a girl to a drive-in movie, and she was never heard from again. She was never found and Larry never confessed, but all eyes rested on him as the

culprit. The incident shook the county-and perhaps Silas most of all. His friendship with Larry was broken, and then Silas left town.

More than twenty years have passed. Larry runs his father's garage but never has any customers. He lives a solitary existence, never able to rise above the whispers of suspicion. Silas has returned to the community as a constable. He and Larry have no reason to cross paths until another girl disappears and Larry is blamed again. And now the two men who once called each other friend are forced to confront the past they've buried and ignored for decades.

This is a book you won't be able to put down once you start reading it.

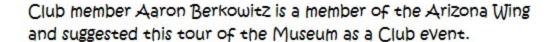

Corvette Market Seminar at Barrett-Jackson
