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It's Camaro vs. Mustang, and the fight is on

It's Camaro versus Mustang, and the fight is on like Beatles versus Stones. But unlike the tired brouhahas the baby boom insists on revisiting -- do we really need to debate Vietnam, women's rights or the Voting Rights Act ever again? -- the pony car battle is as relevant as last month's sales report and Ford and GM's next quarterly earnings. Thoroughly modern versions of the two '60s icons are selling fast and fueling optimism at the automakers.

It might as well be the summer of love again. The Ford Mustang and Chevrolet Camaro have fired the imaginations of drivers, and car buffs are partying like it's 1968. Contents Close

Except that there's nothing retro about Detroit and Dearborn's 21st-Century sport coupes. The Camaro and Mustang bristle with new technologies from voice recognition to direct injection. They have more power and better fuel economy than sophisticated European sport coupes like the BMW 335ci and cost about \$20,000 less.

That has led to a sales surge and old-style Ford versus Chevy chest pounding. The Camaro outsold the Mustang by 7,777 cars for the first five months of this year. The last time Camaro outsold Mustang for a full year was 1985.

Ford is fighting back. The 2011 Mustang just went on sale with new engines and transmissions, including a brand-new 412-horsepower V8 and a 307-horsepower V6 that gets an eye-popping 31 m.p.g. on the highway.

The Mustang outsold the Camaro by 1,294 cars last month.

Chevrolet will counter with at least two new Camaro models next year: a convertible and a high-performance model that revives the hallowed Z28 badge.

The fight is on, with no sign it'll end soon.

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Saving Chevrolet Means Sending 'Chevy' to Dump

Bye-bye, indeed, Miss American Pie. If General Motors has its way, you won't be driving your Chevy to the levee ever again.

According to a New York Times article, on Tuesday, June 8, G.M. sent a memo to Chevrolet employees at its Detroit headquarters, promoting the importance of "consistency" for the brand, which was the nation's best-selling line of cars and trucks for more than half a century after World War II.

A postscript to the memo says a sort of cuss jar - a plastic "Chevy" can - has been situated in the hallway. "Every time someone uses 'Chevy' rather than Chevrolet," the note said, the employee is expected to put a quarter in the can.

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Miniature Real Running Corvette Engine

If you are interested in the engine that powers your Corvette, the following is a website that will give you a better understanding of what goes into your Corvette:

Keep in mind that the models shown are 1960's vintage, but in our current models the basic parts are the same, only much more highly engineered. The basic parts of

the internal combustion engine remain the same. However, there are more hi-tech applications that control the timing, electrical charge to the spark plugs and fuel delivery.

Be sure to check out the running model on the website. The second link is better as the motor runs for the full time. The first one has to be restarted a couple of times.

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Miniature Corvette Engine

The three photos above show the world's smallest known running Chevrolet V-8. Jim Moyer built this 1/6 scale version of a 1964 365 HP Chevrolet Corvette 327. Note the tiny firing order cast into the intake manifold just like on the real thing. The heads and block are machined from billet aluminum. Jim even made stamping dies to make the oil pan, rockers and front cover. The valve covers are investment cast.



Miniature Corvette Engine

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The finished 1/6 scale 5-bearing crankshaft fits in Jim's hand. It utilizes real Babbitt bearings.

In the photo at left, you can see the cylinder heads of the Moyer 327 plus the stamped oil pan and front cover. Some parts inside the engines are made to scale like the 30-30 Duntov camshaft, but some things have to be modified to make a small engine run. Electricity and fuel molecules don't scale, so some parts have to be slightly heavier or larger than exact scale would dictate. Getting a small engine to run requires skill and careful work; getting one to run well is an art.

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BOOK REVIEW

Cutting for Stone By Abraham Verghese

When one of my "book worm" friends suggested reading "Cutting for Stone," I put it on a list of books to read. When looking at the book though, I thought it one that wouldn't really interest me. A couple of weeks ago while soaking up some R&R in Palm Springs, I finished a book, so I turned to my trusty Kindle and started looking for something to read. I ran across "Cutting for Stone" and ordered the sample. I became intrigued with the story and ordered the book. I found it difficult to put down.


The title "Cutting for Stone" is taken from the Hippocratic oath: "I will not cut for stone, even for patients in whom the disease is manifest; I will leave this operation to be performed by practitioners, specialists in this art."

The main characters are Marion and Shiva Stone, identical twin brothers born to a nun, Sister Mary Joseph Praise, and a physician, Thomas Stone, who are

working in a mission hospital in Ethiopia in the 1950's. Sister Mary Joseph is from Madras, India, and assists Dr. Stone, an American, in surgery and patient care. Sister Mary Joseph dies during childbirth, Thomas Stone disappears and never returns, and the brothers are raised by two other physicians at the hospital, Hema and Ghosh, both from Madras.

The book presents an interesting picture of life in Ethiopia during the reign of Haile Selassie, and introduces the reader to the Italian settlements in Ethiopia, particularly Eritrea.

"Cutting for Stone" will absorb your mind because this book has it all: several love stories, the political turmoil of Ethiopia, stories of immigration, coming of age, and above all, medicine.
