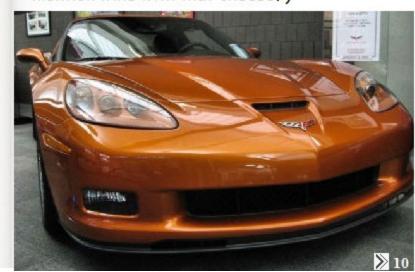

As you all know, we have no General Meeting in July---our next General Meeting will be on August 8. There will also be no Club Acti- vity in July, but in August, we have

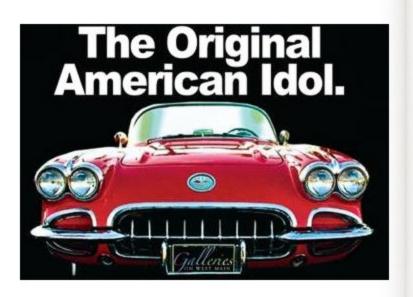

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From The Bowling Green Daily News, June 13, 2012:

Nearly 90 new robots will help streamline the production of the next generation Chevy Corvette at the General Motors Bowling Green Assembly Plant. Those robots have taken their places in the new \$50 million shop where the body of the new Corvette will be assembled. A dozen or so local officials got a peek at the shop Tuesday. But the wraps are still on what the new vehicle will look like or exactly when its production will begin.

"I will say that the last year for the C6 model is 2013," Plant Manager Dave Tatman said. The plant is currently producing a 60th anniversary car and a new convertible that Tatman said he took for a spin recently in Bowling Green. Production work for those vehicles is providing a good bit of overtime. Workers are getting in 11 hours a day, five days a week. In August, they will move to 10-hour days five

days a week and two Saturday workdays. But the buzz - most likely because of the secrecy surrounding it - is still the yet-to-be named next generation Corvette. "The new vehicle is incredibly exciting," he said. "But that's all I can say about it."

GM officials for more than a year have been preparing for the new vehicle. In all, the company will invest \$131 million at the Bowling Green Assembly Plant that will have created an additional 250 jobs, mostly by hiring all of the laid-off Corvette workers and bringing in other laid-off GM employees. There were a few hints along the tour about the timetable. The plant will shut down in July for intensive construction work, during which time the plant also will be closed for tours. Tours will resume in August but will again be suspended Sept. 14 until sometime after production of the next generation begins. The plant will be shut down for a week in October to begin tying in the old part of the plant to the newly retooled section. Part of the reason for suspending tours is because of logistics with having that many extra people in the plant during a changeover and part is to maintain the secrecy around the new model before it goes public, Tatman said

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News from Bowling Green

John Andrews, head of the transition team for the new body shop, and other team members have spent most weeks of the past year in Detroit preparing for the new vehicle, but now all of that work will take place in Bowling Green. Andrews' step had a noticeable pep in it when he walked through the body shop area where the XLR used to be produced. He bragged about how there is more light from skylights and from new lighting fixtures more conducive to work. The old part of the plant will get the same light treatment thanks to an energy efficiency program offered by the state, he said. The area where current production is taking place will be held in waiting, perhaps for future production of another vehicle, Andrews said.

D. Gaines Penn, chairman of the Bowling Green Area Chamber of Commerce, noted that getting more GM employees at the plant was great. "But I wonder how many other jobs are directly attributed to the plant," Penn said. The plant currently has about 100 workers on site that are contracted from other companies, either doing security or other tasks, Tatman said. And those numbers are expected to grow just as production is expected to increase when the new cars come off the line. "There has been con-

siderable interest created in the new car," Tatman said. He said that should increase production considerably but by how much he won't speculate.

John Spencer, another team member, said there also will be more construction workers coming into the plant who will be staying in area motels and eating in local restaurants during the remainder of the project. The indirect impact of the plant has been shown to create seven jobs in the community for every one at the plant, Tatman said. That impact spreads even more because being engaged in the community is incumbent upon GM and its employees, he said. As part of that engagement, employees volunteer their time and contribute money. The General Motors Foundation will give out more than \$1 million this year to the communities they call home. On Tuesday, Tatman handed out checks totaling \$10,000, split equally between Public Theatre of Kentucky, Orchestra Kentucky, Western Kentucky University's Center for Environmental Studies and Sustainability and Friends of Lost River Cave. Tatman said GM has a continuing partnership with WKU's program and last year also contributed \$2,500 to Lost River for its outdoor classroom.

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News from Bowling Green

County Judge-Executive Mike Buchanon, state Reps. Jody Richards, D-Bowling Green, Jim DeCesare, R-Bowling Green, and Sen. Mike Wilson, R-Bowling Green, were among those in attendance Tuesday. All said they appreciate the contributions that GM has made to the community. Tatman jokingly handed Wilkerson a framed dollar bill - that is the amount that GM had to pay the city to "own" the building." Originally a Chrysler air conditioning plant, 30-year bonds were sold to pay for an expansion. GM made lease payments to retire the bonds, after which it would own the building for \$1. In exchange for the framed buck, Wilkerson handed Tatman a bill of sale, a release of the lease and other documents.

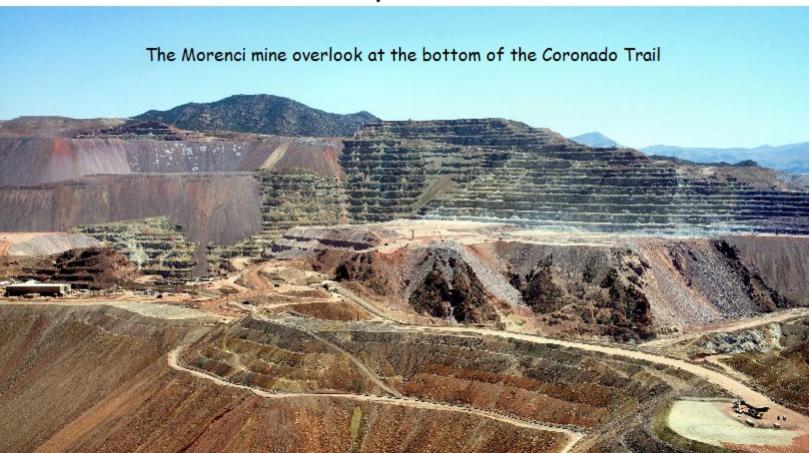


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OUR TRIP UP THE CORONADO TRAIL

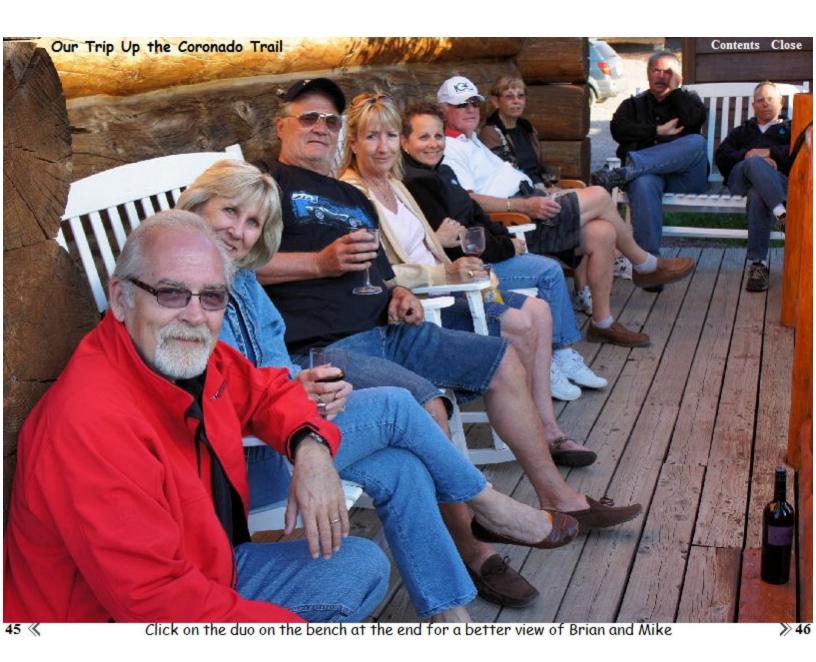

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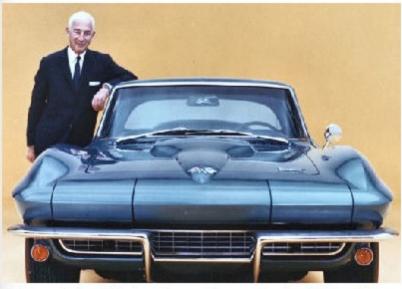
CERV-I INDUCTED INTO BLOOMINGTON GOLD GREAT HALL - JUNE 2012

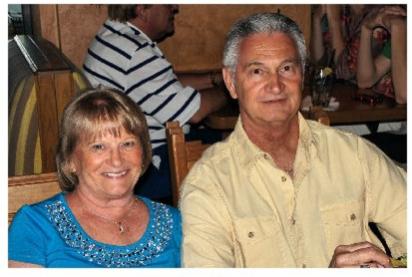
Quarterly Epicurean Dinner at Cantina Laredo

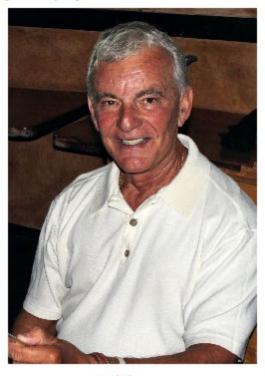

Right across the street from the Promenade Mall is a section of The Central Arizona Project (CAP), which is a 336-mile (541 km) diversion canal in Arizona. "The aqueduct diverts water from the Colorado River from Lake Havasu City near Parker into central and southern Arizona. The CAP is the largest and most expensive aqueduct system ever constructed in the United States." Approximately 5 million people in Arizona receive water from the CAP. It has really allowed Arizona to develop communities and outdoor activities related to tourism. I always think about the CAP water delivery system when I drive along Frank Lloyd Wright Boulevard. There are some wonderful websites, if you are interested in reading more about the CAP project.







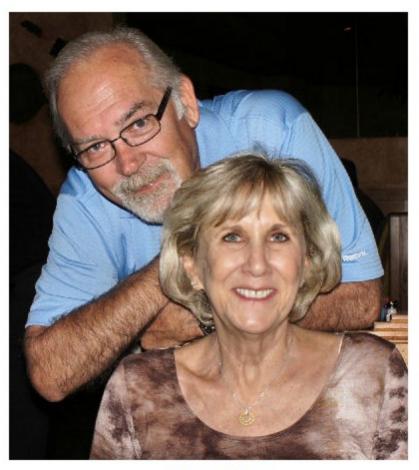

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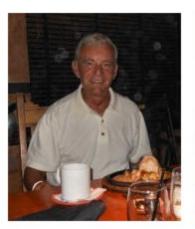


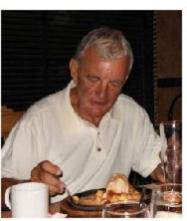

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Chevrolet Corvette Roars Into Its 60th Year

DETROIT - On June 30, 1953, the first of a new kind of Chevrolet - indeed, a new kind of American car - rolled off an assembly line in Flint, Mich.

The car had only two seats. There were no roll-up windows, or exterior door handles, for that matter. Its body wasn't stamped from steel but, rather, molded from reinforced fiberglass.

While the postwar Baby Boom was in full swing, this was definitely not a family car. This was a very personal vehicle, one that promised a driver and a passenger all of the thrills of the open road.

Skeptics gave the car little chance of lasting beyond an initial run of a few dozen units.



However, 60 years later the Chevrolet Corvette survives - and thrives - as an American automotive and cultural icon.

"Through the years, Corvette certainly offered state-of-the-art features, designs, technologies and performance," said Tadge Juechter, vehicle chief engineer for Corvette. "However, I think what has made the Corvette such an enduring concept is the exciting experience of driving one.

"No matter what your station in life, when you're behind the wheel of a Corvette, you're an Olympic athlete - able to go faster, stop quicker, and turn better than everyone else," Juechter continued. "Very few cars can match that experience. And no other car has delivered that experience as well, or to more people, than the Corvette."

Barely five months before Tony Kleiber, a Flint plant body assembler, drove that first Chevrolet Corvette off the line and into automotive history, the icon in the making was little more than a designer's dream.

Corvette was first created under the code-name XP-122 to provide Americans with a glimpse of a European-style sports car designed for this side of the Atlantic. It was one of several concept cars unveiled in January 1953 at the GM Motorama show in the ballroom of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in

New York City.

With a world war not far behind them, people wanting a glimpse of the automotive future lined up around the block to view the new concept vehicles. At the Waldorf Astoria - and at every other Motorama stop across the country -- Chevrolet's sporty little roadster ignited many Americans' imaginations.

In fact, the Corvette was so popular that Chevrolet executives decided to thrust the two-seat roadster into production, albeit on a very limited basis.

Initial plans called for about 150 Corvettes, primarily to help draw potential customers into Chevrolet dealerships scattered across the U.S.'s then-48 states. Overwhelming demand doubled the first-year production to 300 units. The following year, the Corvette moved to a GM assembly facility in St. Louis, Mo., where 3,640 Corvettes were built for the 1954 model year.

Those first Corvettes sparked Americans' 60-year love affair with the Corvette. Since 1953, more than 1.5 million Corvettes have been built. Those cars have become synonymous with American performance - from cruising down Americana on Route 66 to taking the checkered flag at the world's most

prestigious road race, the 24 Hours of Le Mans.

During the coming months, Chevrolet will kick some tires, open the hood, and climb behind the wheel to highlight 60 years of Corvette design, performance and technology milestones. We hope you enjoy the ride.

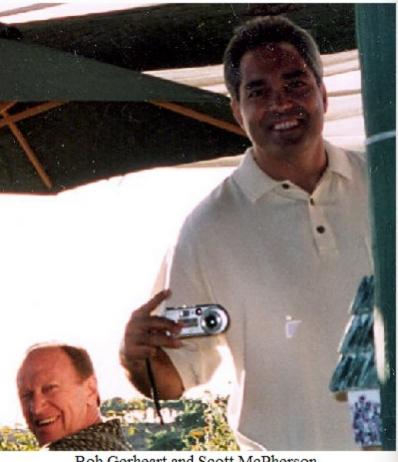

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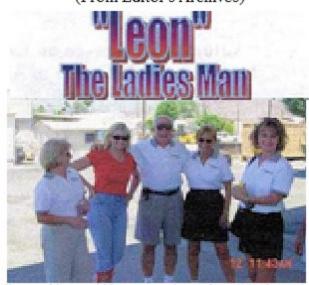

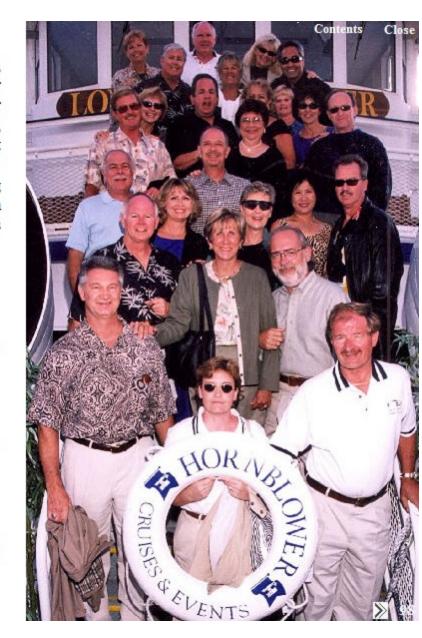

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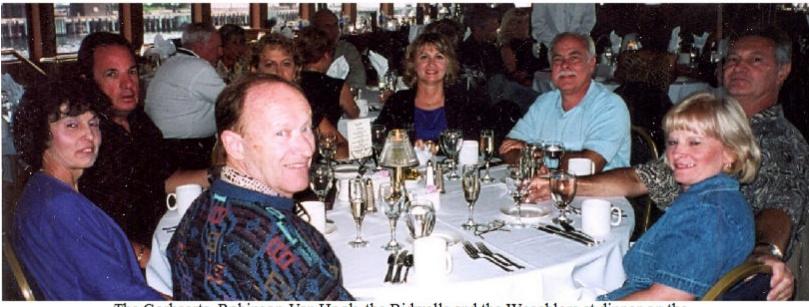

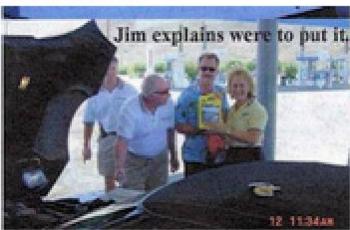

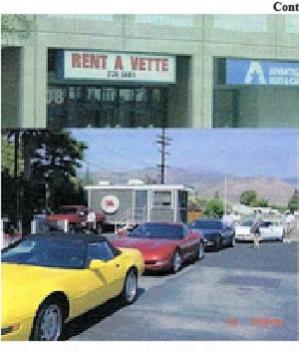
