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HOOKED ON CORVETTE RACING!



"You have never been to a car race before and you start out at Le Mans?" asked Gary Pratt, team manager of Corvette Racing.

"Well, I figured I'd start at the top," I replied.

The one-day trek to Le Mans was mandatory. As we planned our trip to Paris my wife, Karen, and I were giddy about all of the sights we would see. The Louvre, Notre Dame, the Arc de Triomphe, and of course the famous tower that Mr. Eiffel built to commemorate the World's Fair of 1898. Le Mans was not on our "bucket" list. But we won this trip from Chevrolet for being one of the top Corvette Dealers in the country. Chevy wanted to celebrate our sales achievements by treating us to an inside look at Corvette Racing and a first-class trip to the 24 Hours at Le Mans. How can you turn that down?

Our day started early as we took a bus from our hotel in downtown Paris to the train station. The train ride was an experience on its own. The only other train I had taken was a short trip on the "Polar Express" out of Williams, Arizona with our grandkids. Not the same train line. This was a clean modern high-speed machine. The assigned seats were roomy and comfortable. Soon we were skidding along the magnificent French countryside at speeds well over a hundred miles per hour. I'm still in awe at how manicured and pristine the small farms and towns were along the way.

Once we arrived in Le Mans we were taken on a private bus to one of the entrances where our special passes got us directly into the track. The tour guide led us through the grounds past factory and vendor booths loaded with all things racing and Le Mans. (Evidently Steve McQueen is still big here.)

We arrived at our destination for the day, the Chevrolet Suite

The festivities started soon in the suite as Gary Pratt entered with all six drivers from Team Corvette. He proved to be an accomplished public speaker as he took us through some of the history of the Corvette at Le Mans and introduced each driver. He also introduced a special guest, multiple times winner at Le Mans, Ron Fellows. As the introduction wrapped up, the team mingled with the guests in the suite. They were all very friendly and won you over immediately to Corvette Racing.

There was one American driver, a tall handsome young man named Tommy Milner. I noticed that my wife and most of the ladies in the suite became suddenly interested in racing as they hovered around Tommy asking him questions. I just wanted to hang out with Ron Fellows. I got my picture taken with Ron and he autographed my Le Mans ticket.

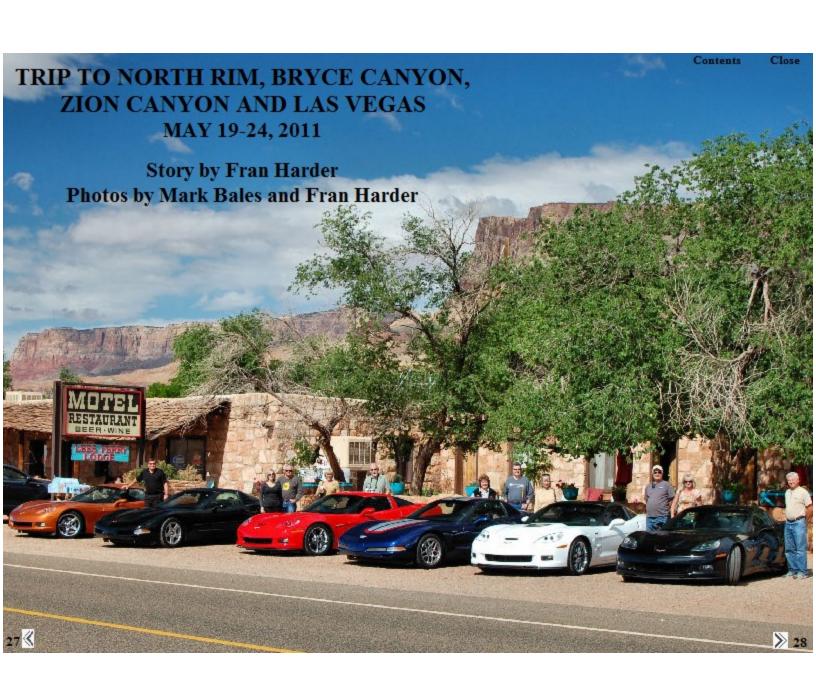

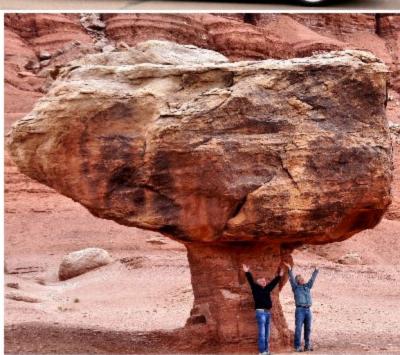

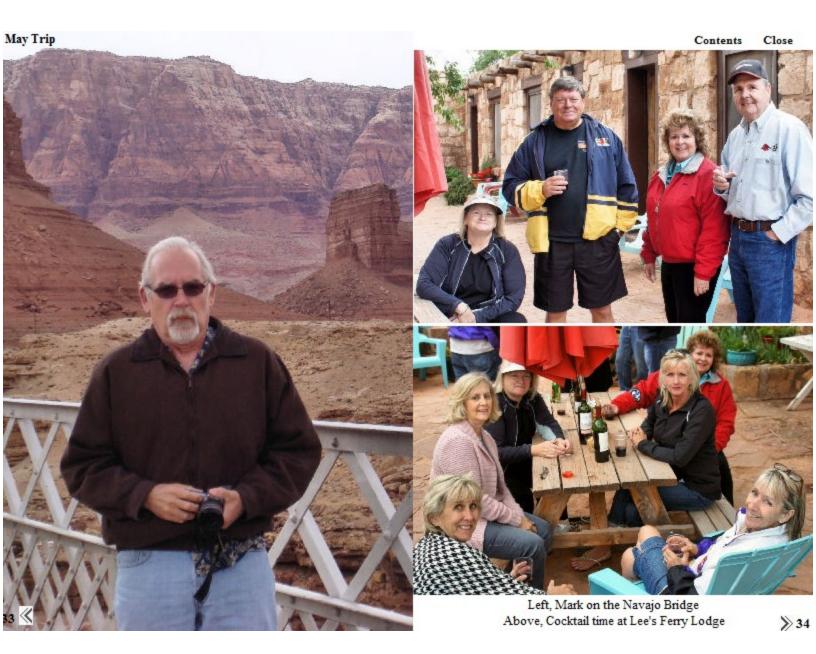

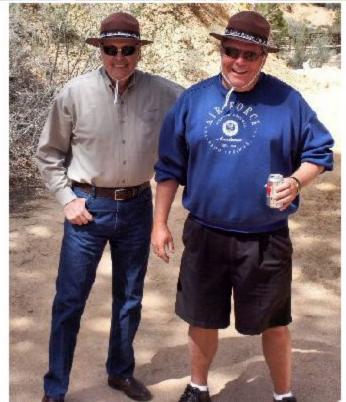

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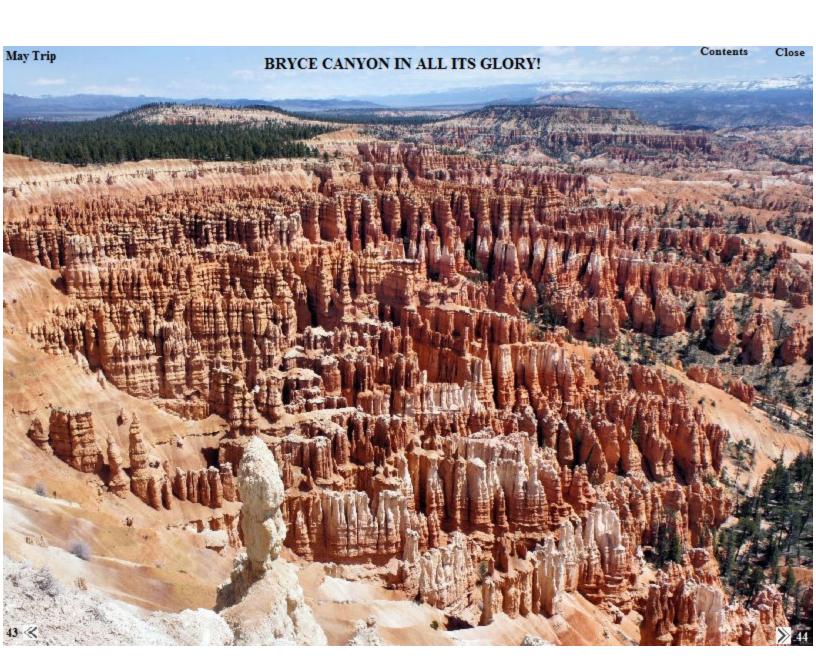

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Corvette Racing 24 Hours of Le Mans in Le Mans, France, June 11-12, 2011



Corvette Racing Car #73, driven by Olivier Beretta, Tommy Milner and Antonio Garcia won the GTE class, completing 314 laps and finishing two minutes and 29 seconds ahead of the runner-up Ferrari. This victory was the seventh class win at Le Mans for Corvette Racing, and its first in the GTE Pro category. It came as Chevrolet celebrates its 100th anniversary and the 10th anniversary of the team's first Le Mans victory in 2001. C6.R #74, driven by Oliver Gavin, Jan Magnussen, and Richard Westbrook, led the GTE class for nearly 16 hours but retired following a crash in the 17th hour. 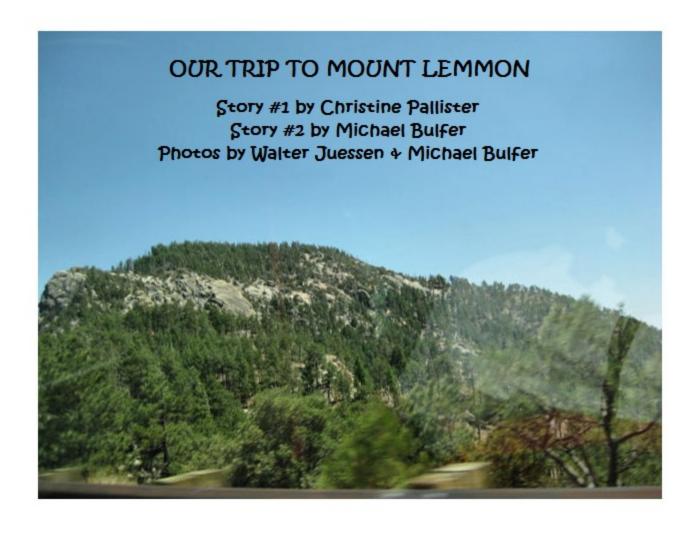

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JUNE 30 2011 58TH ANNIVERSARY OF FIRST PRODUCTION CORVETTE

Fifty-eight years ago, on June 30, 1953, the first production Chevrolet Corvette rolled off the temporary assembly line in Flint, Michigan. This was just six months after the Corvette made its world debut at the 1953 GM Motorama at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City.

The Flint line would build 300 copies of the '53 Corvette--all of them white, with red interiors and black folding tops. Under the hood was the Blue Flame Six, a 235-cubic-inch inline six-cylinder engine rated at 150 hp. It was mated to a two-speed Powerglide automatic transmission.

The price? The 1953 Corvette had a base sticker price of \$3,498. The options list was short: a heater, which added \$91.40, and an AM radio, which added \$145.15--and all 300 cars were built with both options. (From Autoweek 6-30-11)

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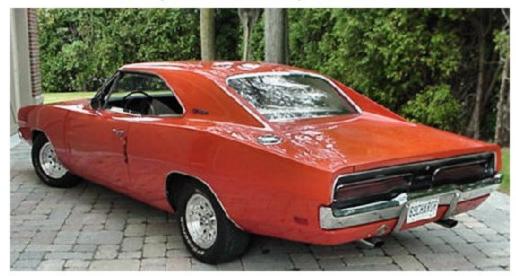
WANNA SEE MY OTHER CAR? - PART FOUR

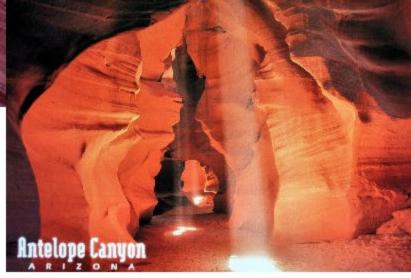
