





We all knew the first retail Corvette C7 would hit the block on Saturday of Barrett-Jackson week, but when would we see the car? The forums were rife with speculation. "Thursday," claimed one post. "Friday afternoon," claimed another. The prevailing consensus was that the car wouldn't be unveiled until it hit the block, or shortly before. With all that in mind, I attended on Thursday, not expecting to see the C7, and my expectations were met.

I spent most of Thursday walking around BJ, taking loads of photos. Photos for personal use, and if Dorinne wanted any, for this newsletter. Enjoyable day, until I got home and looked at my photos. I used a different lens, and apparently not well. Almost all the photos were bad. Bummer!








GM's first use of heat-activated shape memory alloy replaces heavier motorized part

DETROIT - From its fiberglass body in 1953 to its aluminum chassis for 2014, Chevrolet Corvette has a six-decade track record for introducing lightweight materials that improve vehicle performance. With the 2014 Corvette's aluminum frame weighing in 99 pounds lighter than its predecessor, that trend continues.

In addition, the redesigned seventh-generation sports car is the first vehicle to use a General Motors'-developed lightweight shape memory alloy wire in place of a heavier motorized actuator to open and close the hatch vent that releases air from the trunk. This allows the trunk lid to close more easily than on the previous models where trapped air could make the lid harder to close.

Considering there are about 200 motorized movable parts on the typical vehicle that could be replaced with lightweight smart materials, GM is looking at significant mass reduction going forward.

Shape memory alloys - typically made of copperaluminum-nickel or nickel-titanium - are smart ma-

materials that can change their shape, strength, and/or stiffness when activated by heat, stress, a magnetic field or electrical voltage. Shape memory alloys "remember" their original shape and return to it when de-activated.

In the new Corvette, a shape memory alloy wire opens the hatch vent whenever the deck lid is opened, using heat from an electrical current in a similar manner to the trunk lights. When activated, the wire contracts and moves a lever arm to open the vent, allowing the trunk lid to close. Once the trunk lid is closed, the electrical current switches off, allowing the wire to cool and return to its normal shape, which closes the vent to maintain cabin temperature.

"Smart materials like shape memory alloys offer new possibilities for many movable vehicle features," said Jon Lauckner, GM's chief technology officer. "These new materials enable innovative designs and new and improved features at a lower cost than traditional motors and actuators."

Shape memory alloy also helps remove unwanted mass, which can help improve vehicle performance and fuel economy. The wire actuator used on the new Corvette is approximately 1.1 pound (.5 kilogram) lighter than a conventional motorized

system.

"The shape memory alloy used on the new Corvette represents nearly five years of research and development work on smart materials for which GM has earned 247 patents," said Paul Alexander, GM smart materials and structures researcher. "And it is just the beginning. We have many more smart material applications in the pipeline that will bring even more improvements to our vehicles going forward."

I wanted share with you all the preparations I have been performing to get my 1967 Corvette ready to be judged NCRS (National the regional Corvette Restorers Society) on March Being a member of NCRS (it's really a society of nitpickers and only masochists like myself join), you have a desire to own and drive a car that is as original as the day it was built, in this case, February 6, 1967, St. Louis. Having said that, most of you that have seen the car would probably ask what needs to be done? Glad you asked! So I will try to provide you with some insights into my preparation. There are three categories that they will judge the car's originality on: Mechanical, Interior and Exterior.

Let's start with Mechanical. I will lose points on the engine because of the number: 7110261, front stamp VOII2HH (HH = 300 HP). This means the car was built with the standard 300 HP engine, not the upgraded L79 version or HD = 350 HP, SIGH. I knew that when I bought it, and it didn't matter to me, but it will to the judges. Indeed, in order to fix that. I would have change the manifold and carburetor plus a few other minor things. also lose points because there is no spare tire (I do have the wheel), wrong window washer color (not stock GM green), non-stock battery, not original 2-ply tires but radials. Oh yeah, forgot the clock... I replaced the analog with a quartz and that will cost me points... Oh well

What I have fixed is: Clock, high beam switch, sound-proofing under the dash, headlight motor on the driver's side re-

repaired (was working but not as well as it should), all locks are now 1967 vintage along with keys, ORIGINAL windshield wiper motor, starter were repaired and painted correct GM color for each unit, water temp sending unit changed out and replaced with correct unit, battery replaced, wiring clips in various places in the engine compartment and under the dash, replaced the correct hood bolts and screws in lower grill facing area, on the suspension all nuts, bolts, cotter pins were replaced and tightened, adjusted parking brake, fixed seatbelts so they work well. In addition, the odometer stopped working recently - of course it did - so we had to remove the steering wheel, and dash and found some other things that need some TLC, SIGH ...

The frame components and suspension parts are, frankly, cleaner and newer than all of <u>your cars</u>. The frame stenciled numbers and body shim codes that

were affixed to the frame when it was built are all in the correct place, have the correct color, and I do not expect any point deductions for this.

Interior is excellent, except for the clock of course, and the previous owner didn't correctly place the seats; that is, they sit on top of the carpeting not underneath so that would be a minor deduction also, but everything else is good and should be fine.

Exterior Body panels are all original, and all lines, gaps are correct and actually better than new. I will probably lose points on the paint job since there is no orange peel, and the door jambs are just too good, SIGH.

That is about it, except my friend the judge just told me I didn't have the correct "clear" mats, SIGH. I believe the car is about 97 percent there, maybe even 98.5%, and my goal is to validate

that. Wish me luck all...because the pain will be intense! You see, I'll be there as a learner judge, listening to them tear my baby apart, SIGH.




Vette-Togethers

On August 20 a group of 7 Corvettes set out from Fountain Hills for our much awaited trip to Canyon de Chelly (pronounced d'Shay). As we headed north on 87 toward Payson, Kay Schaffroth, one of our newest members, said we looking like a "Corvette Convoy." We could see large areas off of 87 that had been burned by the recent fires.

Everyone enjoyed a great lunch at Kohl's Ranch east of Payson.



Heading north at Heber, we had a beautiful ride with little traffic before passing trhough Holbrook and turning east on 40. We entered the Navajo In-




dian Reservation going north on 191. Walter was not sure he could recover from the jet lag of the new time zone - the Navajo Nation follows daylight savings time! Dick Kulczycki's new car was baptized when we encountered some heavy rains on this desolate stretch of highway.

Our next stop was at the Hubbell Trading Post. This is the oldest continuously operating trading post in the Navajo Nation, and is a great place to visit, especially if you want to buy an authentic Navajo rug, jewelry or other native crafts. The trading post was founded by John Hubbell who was a great friend of the Navajo people.

Late in the day we arrived in Chinle, just outside the park entrance, where we set up camp at the

Best Western. We settled in, had a few drinks from our traveling bars (there is no alcohol served anywhere on the reservation), and ate dinner at one of the few restaurants in town. The Navajo Taco was pretty darn good!


The next morning we embarked on our tour of the canyon floor. Visitors are not allowed to go into the canyon on their own so we hired several Navajo guides with jeeps. Navajo families still Contents Close



live in the canyon in the summer, growing corn and raising sheep. Animals are allowed to roam wherever they choose on the reservation.

Archeological evidence shows that people have lived in these canyons for nearly 5000 years. Paintings on the canyon walls tell stories of how the early people lived. Later they built mutistoried household compounds on the ledges high up on the canyon walls, many of which can still be seen today. Many different people lived here: ancient Puebloan, Anasazi, Hopi, and today the

Navajo. At the entrance of the canyon the walls are only 30 feet high, but as you go deeper into the canyon, the walls reach more than 1000 feet above the canyon floor. Among these peaceful surrounds we also found - you guessed it, vendors! Many of our members took advantage of the beautiful (and reasonable) jewelry and art work being sold by the Navajo at some of the sites.]

After a four-hour tour of the canyon floor, we had lunch at Thunderbird Lodge and then headed out with the cars to drive the South Rim Drive. We stopped at many overlooks to look into the canyon, but everyone's favorite was the farthest point, Spider Rock. This is an 800-foot sandstone spire that rises from the canyon floor at the junc-

tion of several canyons. It was beautiful, and we think this is where they filed the Jeep commercial!

We all agreed we had a terrific day visiting this beautiful park, and later enjoyed a nice dinner together.
