

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE NEW GENERAL MANAGER OF VAN CHEVROLET

We met with Matt Cerreta in his office at Van Chevrolet on a Monday morning in late February. Matt is an Arizona native. His grandfather owned the Cerreta Candy Company in downtown Glendale, and Matt worked there one summer while in high school. He graduated in 2004 from Arizona State University with a Business Economics Degree. While in college he worked as a bartender at Carlos O'Brien's, and that is where he met his wife. He has been married for fourteen years and has three daughters ages 12, 10 and 7.

When we asked what made him decide he wanted to be in the car business, he said he started right out of college. He had become friends with Chuck Mullins' son, and came into Van Chevrolet for service one day. While there he talked with Chuck, and he started selling cars at Van Chevrolet in 2004. He has sat in every chair at Van, and is now the general manager and managing partner of Van Chevrolet. He had his 15-year anniversary with the Van Tyle organization, which amounts to 12 years with Van and three years with Pinnacle Nissan where he was the general manager.

When asked about the mid-engine Corvette that is in the works, Matt asked us a couple of questions: will the price tag which is rumored to be in the \$150,000 range deter the average Corvette owner? Are true Corvette owners going to go for the mid-engine design? Of course, no one has the answers to those questions and many others about this new addition to the Corvette line.

We asked Matt if there is a salesman specializing in Corvettes at Van, and he told us he prefers that we call him personally if we're interested in buying a car - any car that Van offers, not just Corvettes. He did mention that he hopes more of our members will buy Vettes from Van, and he will definitely work with us to make that happen. A Day With Frank Lloyd Wright


The Adventure, The Man

We know of legends like Babe Ruth, Albert Einstein and Amelia Earhart. We celebrate rare artists like Pablo Picasso, Vladimir Horowitz and Luciano Pavarotti. And we recognize rock stars like Paul McCartney, Stevie Ray, Vaughn Monroe and Frank Lloyd Wright.

Frank Lloyd Wright!??



Actually, Frank Lloyd Wright was both a Legend in architecture and a renowned Artist of design, and lived life like a Rock Star during his time. It was a pleasure to be on this trip to explore and learn about Frank Lloyd Wright and his contributions to architecture. The day was perfect to spend time with fellow SCC Members enjoying the beautiful weather, wonderful food, driving our Corvettes and learning about this iconic man. I was fascinated to learn about all the influences Wright had in the architectural design and work of The Arizona Biltmore, as well as so many other structures of his time which still presently continue to influence modern architectural design.

Unlike my more lighthearted article written of Route 66 last year, this article reflects the more serious side of a trip involving a man possessed with vision, exactness, details and drive toward perfection. During the tours, some secrets were revealed of who this man was in character and behavior. And perhaps, a "little" self indulgence sprinkled along his way.

This was our first SCC trip of the year, and I am honored to be sharing it with you.

But, before I share what I learned, let's eat!

THE EXPERIENCE BEGINS

As we all drove up to the hotel, Wright's influence was already evident in the exterior of the building which was framed with the manicured lawn proudly exclaiming "Arizona Biltmore."



At the valet parking area, our keys were accepted, receipts handed out and we proceeded toward the hotel entrance. Looking back, we could see the valets backing our Corvettes side by side and in front of the hotel. All our glimmering beauties reflecting the bright sunshine in wonderful colors were lined up for everyone to admire. And admire, everyone did.



We greeted and walked in with Peter and Lucy Boland across the beautiful lobby, and past Jerry Harris, the pianist playing wonderfully on a black baby grand piano. I had the pleasure to talk with Jerry and found that he has been playing on and off here for about 15 years.



We entered through the large hallway where I introduced myself to Brian and Deborah Anton and, to my surprise, find that they have been Members with the Club for 3 years. I find it is always a pleasure to meet Members for the first time during these trips, whether they are new or have been in the Club for some time.

The hallway entrance to *Wright's at the Biltmore Restaurant* was lined with a lavish buffet offering multiple pastries and breads, assorted fresh seafood, cold shellfish featuring cracked crab claws and shrimp, grilled vegetables, carved rack of savory prime rib, charcuterie and cheeses, salads and multiple shelves of assorted and amazingly decadent desserts.

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






After being greeted by hotel management, we were directed to our reserved table located several feet inside the entrance and stretching almost to the back of the restaurant. It took up almost the entire middle of the main dining room. Dorothy Durby graciously kept company with Suzy and Charles at a separate table which was set up adjacent to this main table.

Enough desserts. Coffee cups drained. After five times to the buffet line, I am totally satiated and can barely move. I think I need a nap. Leader John instructs us to gather in the lobby. We all scatter for some private minutes before regrouping. I spend more time visiting with the pianist, Jerry. "Wow, you never use sheet music. How do you remember so many songs?"

THE JEWEL OF THE DESERT

Once we have regathered in the lobby, we wait for a few minutes for other SCC Members, who did not join us for brunch, to arrive. Our tour guide with a French accent introduces himself as Rob Razavi, History Tour Director. To begin our journey, he escorts us to the Aztec room, which has its ceiling completely covered in gold leaf foil. Here, we learn about Wright's philosophy of organic architecture ... designing structures that were in harmony with humanity and its environment. We also learned that, while influenced by Frank Lloyd Wright's Prairie School movement of architecture, the actual design of this hotel is credited to Albert Chase McArthur who worked with Wright between 1907 and 1909.

I begin learning about Wright's persona as snippets of information and commentary are shared by Mr. Razavi. During one of Wright's many financial and legal struggles, during con-

struction of the Biltmore, he sold the concrete textile block system to McArthur for use in building the hotel. Problem was, the patents for this system actually belonged to another company which caused quite an embarrassment to Albert's family when the patent holders sued for patent infringement. Wright kept the money.

The first guests helped to inaugurate the official opening in 1929. It took three days to accommodate the long list of privileged high society partygoers whose attendance was by personal invitation only. After leaving the Aztec Room, we walk a short way to a large meeting room which served as the hotel cafeteria. We learn about the little house next door on the hill, the Wrigley Mansion and the influence of Chicago chewing gum magnate William Wrigley Jr. during his ownership of The Arizona Biltmore Hotel.

Mr. Razavi describes some of the huge linen pictures covering entire walls and how dinners were held and meetings were conducted within this room. He paints pictures of some of the guests who came and stayed here while enjoying the best of everything the Biltmore could lavish on them.

However, Mr. Wrigley also had some very strict rules and expectations from his guests. One of those rules was that if you did not show up on time at exactly 6:00 p.m., the main dining room door was shut. You were barred from entering this main dining area and isolated from the rest of the guests enjoying dinner. That is correct, not even a piece of gum was offered.

Mr. Wrigley built the resort's first swimming pool which became Marilyn Monroe's favorite pool. This is also the site where Irving Berlin penned his famous "White Christmas." I can begin to picture how grand it must have been to dine with the movie stars, political figures and the movers and shakers of that time. And, just as in classic movies with Fred Astaire, everyone was expected to dress in their finest at every dinner, for every event and most of the time.

We move on through the hotel and view more of Wright's influences. We climb the staircase to the second floor which allows us to oversee the most recent renovation of the main lobby completed during the fall of 2016. We learn about Wright's signature hidden and indirect lighting, the block style structures, secret passageways and the Gold Room which posed as a library, while in actuality, it really served as a speakeasy during prohibition.





He shares some of the names of the rich, famous and a particular movie star, Clark Gable, who always insisted on staying in the same room since it was the closest to the *library*. Powerful people including all past Presidents since Herbert Hoover to George W. Bush have been guests at the Biltmore. Ronald and Nancy Reagan celebrated their honeymoon at this hotel.

Wright was always broke and habitually borrowed money on many occasions. His taste of, and for, life was reflected by his extravagance and spending habits.

The tour continues as we make our way through the hotel and, as we pass by, we are allowed to peek into the infamous Gold Room which has a large key prominently displayed on the wall (see photo on page 12). We are escorted outside to the back of the hotel and can view the rest of the manicured grounds and the different buildings. All the structures reflect Wright's architectural influences of the "Biltmore Block," a variation of a block system Wright used to construct private homes.






This unit block design was pre-cast blocks made from the local desert sand and created in thirty-four different geometric patterns with inspiration from the trunk of a palm tree. This is the strong imprint in the main lobby and remains the signature element of the textile block system for the hotel's appearance. It is highlighted with a color which reflects the surrounding desert hues.

So much rich history. So many stories. Suzy Cruisy and Charles inform me that they have experienced the pleasure of staying at the Arizona Biltmore. Their recommendation is definitely good enough for me.

The Arizona Biltmore tour has come to an end. Now, it is time to visit Frank Wright's Taliesin West, his home, teaching facility and foundation in Scottsdale.



TALIESIN WEST: HIS WINTER HOME

We all exit the hotel and accept keys from the valets. Our Corvettes gradually line up and follow each other while catching the attention of some folks lining our route out of the hotel. Once heading north on Highway 51, everyone chooses their routes and heads out separately toward the McDowell Mountains foothills. Taliesin is appropriately located on 12621 North Frank Lloyd Wright Blvd.

I exit onto Shea Blvd and find John and Linda following me. We chat on our radios while proceeding onward west toward Taliesin. Once we turn onto Cactus Road, I find a wonderfully smooth, slightly curving road with little traffic and framed by beautiful homes on large horse properties. There are multiple traffic circles along the way which only gives me more reason to downshift and accelerate enthusiastically around them. The "gggeeeee!!" force gives Marie and me a big reason to smile.



We arrive to the Taliesin entrance driveway. It is a nicely paved road with several fun turns and extends about a quarter mile into the property toward the main buildings. Everyone finds parking wherever they can and proceed to meet in the main entrance area. There is a gift shop and refreshment area. We wait for the rest of our group to arrive.

Courageous Lucy, strapped in her ankle boot, guardedly walked up the unevenly paved walkway to the main entrance area when Beverly, our Taliesin tour guide, walked over to assist her. Beverly insisted that Lucy should be very careful. The ever attentive Peter stepped in and asked sympathetically "Why does she need to be careful? It's already broken." All the ladies around them began to laugh.

I admire your perseverance, Lucy, and give you my empathy for what you must endure. I leave you this solacing encouragement that at least one of your pains will eventually heal and go away.

Seems to be a pattern similar from The Arizona Biltmore as more morsels of information, rumors and anecdotes are shared by our tour guide even before the tour begins. Wright had total disregard for traffic regulations. He had multiple speeding, accidents and, especially, red light violations. Apparently, Wright loved cars and if he could have had a Corvette, it would have been in his favorite color – red.



Beverly begins the tour and escorts us to our first stop, Wright's office and main greeting room. She points out the angular doorway which our taller members had to stoop a little to enter. We view his desk, special chairs he designed, the windows and the angularity of the building. Since this was his winter home, there were no air conditioners then, or now. Canvas panels over window frames could be rolled up or down to keep out sun and weather. A fireplace provided necessary warmth. While in this office, Wright invariably dressed up in a suit, just in case a visitor, or a prospective client, showed up.

The group learns that Taliesin is an actual working architectural school, not a museum. There are presently approximately thirty students studying here during the winter. Wright's past students provided free labor to assist building parts of Taliesin West including the hand-formed retaining wall. As part of Wright's philosophy for their education, he believed this hands-on-method of instruction assisted in their learning about using materials and resources of the land and the surroundings.

And, as prior students had done, present students still sleep in individual outside tents, devoid of electricity or running water. Wright expected them to fully take advantage of all the materials and resources which were available to them as well as whatever their surroundings provided. Upon graduation, they are evaluated on their resourcefulness in their use of these materials, as well as their ingenuity in their design for functionality.

Wright built a home for Herbert F. Johnson, of Johnson Wax Company, in 1938 to 1939 after designing the Johnson Wax Headquarters Building. There is a story that, during a storm, the roof started leaking. Mr. Johnson supposedly called Frank Wright to complain about the leak. When Wright asked him where this leak was, Herbert explained that it was leaking on the chair where he was sitting. Wright solved the problem by instructing Mr. Johnson to move the chair.

We learned that Frank Wright spent approximately six years living in Japan. This would explain the evidence of the Asian influences within some of his work, as well as the multiple Asian displays at Taliesin. Also evident are multiple, original "Sprites" statues around the grounds which were in display at the Arizona Biltmore as well. However, the ones at the Biltmore are copies.

The tour continues as the group gathers in front of the main building. We have good view of the outside of this building where students attend class and visitors are welcomed to stay and enjoy Wright's hospitality. The grounds are beautiful with the second story windows looking toward Old Town Scottsdale. The buildings clearly reflect Wright's angularity in design and are emphasized with the triangular pond in front.



Wright had three major periods of design: rectangular, triangles/angular and circles. Wright also had three wives (Catherine Lee Tobin, Maude Noel and Olgivanna Lazovich Hinzenburg). Scandal occurred when Wright, still married to first wife Catherine, left to travel in Europe with Martha Borthwick. She was the wife of electrical engineer Edwin Cheney who was Wright's neighbor and who commissioned Wright to design a home for them. Five years later, tragedy occurred while Wright was away as Martha and her two children were murdered while living in Wright's Taliesin home.

By now, many of us are feeling the heat and sunshine. Frank and I discuss how warm we were getting even though the temperature is not that high. The sunshine just seemed to be hotter than usual. I can see the rest of the group doing the Arizona shuffle ... seeking shelter in any little bit of shade possible.

Peter Boland is still wearing his cashmere coat! When I ask him why he isn't hot, he just smiles and informs me that he likes the heat. I take back my earlier remarks about him and Lucy and affirm that Peter remains a pretty cool guy. Luckily, our tour continues into the entertainment/main meeting room. We have an opportunity to cool off a little and rest.

This entertainment room is where Wright would hold gatherings, parties and social events to allow students to learn how to mingle and prepare them for the social necessities of the business world. Wright designed the origami chairs we take turns sitting in. We are introduced to the baby grand piano he would play while his students played along with any instruments they had. The interior structural theme is pointed out and emphasized as evidence of Wright's building design philosophy. Angularity, sloping roof, open areas, use of natural surrounding material, textures and colors of the nature surrounding Taliesin and recessed lighting of Wright's own design provided soft illumination.

Wright once designed a glass bowl and shelf next to a window, but it was approximately a couple of inches larger in diameter than expected once on the shelf. Instead of allowing the bowl to be moved on the shelf away from the window as suggested by his Staff, Wright insisted to have the window cut so the bowl could sit outside the pane of glass on the exact position on the shelf as he envisioned.







We move on to Wright's living quarters just about fifty feet from the exit of the meeting room. He had a private living unit which I surprisingly found to be very simplistic, especially since learning earlier about Wright's penchant for extravagances. It was a small open room with low ceiling which connected the bedroom, living room and bathroom facilities together. The highlight was the all-aluminum-covered bathroom ... quite a bit ahead of the times.

Wright slept in a separate and personal unit next door to third wife, Olgivanna's, unit. He had two small twinsize beds next to each other which were separated by a partition-type wall. The outer, or day, bed was exposed to a small window which allowed you to see in. The inner, or night, bed was sheltered by the partition and the rest of the unit. During day naps, if you could view him awake or reading through the window, it was permissible to disturb him. If he was napping, or not visible, you were not allowed to disturb him.

We walked into the back part of the main building. We peered into the student dining room with linen and crystal ware. A large bell in the campus steeple rings out at 11:30 a.m. and again 6:00 p.m. signaling lunch and dinner respectively. It is highly expected that everyone understands the importance of being attentive, courteous and prompt.

In back of this main building are citrus groves which leads us to the main auditorium. The entire room and seating reflects Wright's favorite color which, again, is red. After sitting for a quick overview, we are then led to the final part of the tour, the theater. The entrance and exits are part of Wright's design for compression and expansion - smaller entries which open up to grand exits.

The interior shape of the auditorium is also classic Wright's design as floors, ceilings and walls are all different sizes and angles. Reason? This theater is approximately 98% acoustically correct with merely using architectural brilliance of design ... no speakers, no wires, no assistance. Beverly demonstrates by ringing some chimes on stage in front of the auditorium. I purposely sit all the way in back to experience the benefits of Wright's design. Beautiful, crystal clear tones ... it works.

Our tour guide bids us farewell and we exit back to the main Taliesin entrance area. Our trip is ended. It now becomes the visitor's decision as to what Frank Lloyd Wright was, how he lived and the importance of the contributions he made. I still hold on to my initial premise, especially now after viewing just one of his seminal influences on a living architectural masterpiece, The Arizona Biltmore.

As I learned, America's most heralded architect, Frank Lloyd Wright, was indeed a Legend as an architect and Artist of visionary design. His ideas and influences are more predominate than I realized. His impact continues to this day and is all around us in Arizona prairie-style homes featuring low-pitched roofs, overhanging eaves, horizontal lines, carports and open interiors. One of the ideas and designs he had is currently being used in many high-rise buildings with use of large pieces of glass as exterior shingles.

His home designs are renowned as evidenced by his cantilevered home designed in 1935, 43 miles southeast of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, incorporating a waterfall both inside and outside of the house. This landmark is appropriately named Fallingwater and is listed among Smithsonian's "Life List" of 28 places to visit before you die, as well as American Institute of Architecture's "best all-time work of American architecture" in 1991.

And, as mentioned, he was also a Rockstar ... in the ways he lived, was treated and regarded. There was so much more that I learned from this trip than I can write about within this short report. The anecdotes and rumors written here were shared by different tour staff members. Whether accurate, or not, will be up to your inquisitiveness and eagerness to discover. I was so intrigued that I was prompted to do my own research on what may be truth, or mere urban legend. I hope this story may stimulate your interest to find out more on your own about Frank Lloyd Wright.

This was a great trip of sharing the company of fellow Members, enjoying great food while learning something interesting. I look forward to more fun, wonderful events, as well as more educational trips. During brunch, Mike Reagan revealed that he has lived in Arizona for many years and only several years ago, finally visited the Grand Canyon with his brother. SCC trips like this one are a great way to learn more about Arizona while sharing wonderful camaraderie. I hope you do not take years before signing up to join all the SCC event opportunities and taking part in all the fun.

I was interested in seeing and photographing as many 'Vettes as possible, and while we did not see every Corvette there, I ended up with a great representation. In addition, Joan and I bought each other National Corvette Museum logo jackets from the museum exhibit that is staffed every year for the entire nine days of the show by a lovely volunteer retired couple from Kentucky who only receive reimbursement of their travel expenses – no pay!

After the auction ended, I researched the docket and compiled the following statistics.

Of approximately 1750 vehicles that were auctioned, 146 or 8.3% were Corvettes, not including resto-mods. By generation:

- C1 32 (22% of Corvettes) prices ranging from \$47,300 to \$385,000.
- C2 43 (29%) prices ranging from \$39,600 to \$1.1 MM (charity car).
- C3 38 (26%) prices ranging from \$13,200 to \$495,000.
- C4 19 (13%) prices ranging from \$7150 to \$350,000 (a charity car that was donated back and then sold a second time).
- C5 8 (5%) prices ranging from \$15,950 to \$49,500 (a Z06 with 14 original miles).
- C6 3 (2%) prices ranging from \$36,300 to \$66,000.
- C7 3 (2%) prices ranging from \$78,100 to \$1.4MM. The \$1.4MM car was a Carbon 65 model that was auctioned with the help of former President George W. Bush on behalf of veterans charities. The other vehicle was the first production 2019 ZR1 that was auctioned for charity and sold at \$925,000.


