Sunday we will return to the Valley on our own, so we can sleep in and leave late, or rise early and take off for home.





AN INTERVIEW WITH WALTER AND MICHELE JUESSEN

On Wednesday evening, February 7th, Jim and I went to Walter and Michele Juessen's home. It was a balmy winter day in Phoenix, and we sat comfortably on the Juessens' patio, asking questions of Walter and Michele for this article.

As most of you know, Walter and Michele are an international couple - Walter was born and grew up in Romania and Hungary, which were socialist states in Eastern Europe, and Michele was born and raised in Switzerland. Walter was in hotel management and traveled extensively throughout the world, when he met Michele and her family in Switzerland. Walter went to work in Michele's family's sporting goods busi-

ness, and Michele's father jokingly said Walter had gone "from hotel executive to shoe salesman." He and Michele have been married for thirty-two years.

In the 1970's while the Cold War was still going on, Walter's mother became interested in investing in other countries so that the family would have a place to live if the need arose. In 1979 as they were traveling from Hong Kong to Mexico, they decided to stop in Las Vegas for a short visit. They stayed for two weeks, and loved the weather and the small town atmosphere of Las Vegas at that time. They came back a few months later and bought a home, where they lived four or five months a year. Walter's brother lived in Scottsdale, and they visited him often, and Michele and Walter came to live in Scottsdale in 1988 and divided their time between Gstaad,

He and Michele had been looking for a social organization, came to a meeting, and found that they hit it off with the group. Walter is in his second year as Activities Director of the Club, and is enthusiastic about the planning and implementation of events and activities for the Club members.

When asked whether they had explored Arizona before becoming involved with SCC, Walter said they had not to any great extent. He has gone rafting down the Colorado River three times (Michele declined to participate) and loved the experience.

As far as hobbies and other personal interests, Walter says he likes to work around the house, bicycle, watch basketball and other sports, travel, and work on the computer. Right now he is preoccupied with getting his business settled in Switzerland. Michele loves to do old fashioned knitting, crocheting and sewing, and especially likes to alter clothing.



CORVETTE TECHNICAL INFORMATION AND WEB SITES

Well, I am still working on and waiting to get the technical updates that I discussed last issue. I have not given up and will keep working on it until it happens.

One of our members, Robert Avondo, had an experience with his rear differential that was interesting. He was getting a clanking in the rear end at low speeds. His first complaint was greeted with the response "that's normal." On his second visit with a different service writer, he was asked if he had time to wait while they corrected the problem. The problem written on the service order was "c/s hearing a loud grinding/clanking at times 'Mooing' noises from rear of vehicle when making slow sharper turns."

The repair required was changing the rear differential lubricant and adding an oil additive. In reviewing this I found that the Corvette uses both limited slip technology as well as positraction. The limited slip is active in the active handling mode whereas the positraction engages when slip is detected at one of the real wheels.

This problem was quite prevalent with early model Corvettes. I had not seen or heard of this since the C-3 models. However, the fix is still the same as it was back then.



What's New For Corvette? 2008 and Beyond

By now you have probably read about the two special edition 2007 Corvettes. The Special Edition Ron Fellows Z06, and the Special Edition Indy Pace Car, will be available this spring. Both are cosmetic only, with no performance upgrades. Production will be limited to 500 Pace Cars, and 300 Ron Fellows Z06s. Some of both will be destined for Europe. But wait... There's more!

General Motors plans to release information on the 2008 Corvette during the National Corvette Museum's annual C5/C6 Bash, April 26th - 28th. However, the wonders of the Internet have provided us a sneak peak. Here's what (we think!) we know:

The Coupe, Convertible and Z06 will have two new interior choices, Sienna Custom Leather Wrap and Linen Custom Leather Wrap.

There will be two new exterior colors. The names may change, but right now they are code 85U, Bluestream, and code 89U, Crystal (Claret?). Cancelled after 2007 are Monterey Red and LeMans Blue. Actually, I read that these colors may be cancelled before the end of the 2007 model run.

The QX3 chrome wheels may not be available on the Coupe and Convertible, but Q76, the Z06 chrome wheel appears to remain. The Coupe and Convertible may get QG6 as the Split Spoke standard wheel, optional QX1 Split Spoke Competition Grey, and optional QG7 Forged Polished. There is some speculation the new Split Wheel will first appear on the Special Edition Indy Pace Car, this spring.



The 4LT package will be added to the Coupe and Convertible, but no info on what it is. The Z06 picks up a new 3LZ, but again no content known. In addition, the automatic may get GU2 as a 2.73 performance axle.

What's New for Corvette?

The big news is that the 6.2L LS3 engine is a go for 2008! Rumors and speculation run rampant on the forums. Anywhere from a 5 hp increase (ala, the LS1 change in the C5) to 25 hp, but 35 if the Z51 performance package is ordered. Chevy has a 6.2L "displacement on demand" V-8 in its truck lineup, but it is doubtful Corvette would receive this technology. Hey, it's a sports car!

Another rumor floating around, and I would treat this as a rumor only, is that the Z51 performance package would become, almost, a new model positioned between the base C6 and the Z06. Along with the usual Z51 goodies, the exhausts would be replaced by the Z06 units. This and other changes would kick the horsepower above the base car. A 2% increase over the base car ain't much of a kick, so I wouldn't hold my breath on this one. Interesting speculation.

Other BIG NEWS is the time-line for the introduction of the next generation C7 Corvette. Supposedly, the C7 will begin production in the summer of 2010, as a 2011 model. If true, it should pop up at the Detroit auto show in January of 2010. That also means spy photos should hit the internet the fall of 2009.


And finally, during the recent Chicago Auto Show, Bob Lutz confirmed there will be a Super Vette. It will be introduced in 2009. Although Mr. Lutz mentioned 600 hp, there is speculation the output may be 650 hp. This would top the new Viper's 600 hp. The price will likely be in the six figures. Looking back at mark-up on the Z06, expect to pay considerably more.

It's going to be an exciting couple years in the Corvette world. Stay tuned!


Despite these efforts, there are a number of us in the club who believe that we can do even more for our community.

A Flight From The Past By Dick Gutherless

For Christmas my wonderful bride, Linda, gave me a most amazing present - a gift certificate for a ride on the World War II B-17, Sentimental Journey, restored by the Arizona Wing of the Commemorative (formerly Confederate) Air Force.

On Sunday, January 7th, I took the ride. We had about an hour's briefing and then it was out to the tarmac at Falcon Field where the plane was waiting. We boarded very carefully as there is not much room. I was assigned the nose for takeoff where you had to crawl on hands and knees to enter. As we 6 passengers and 4 crew settled in, the engines turned slowly and then roared to life one by one until all 4 props were whirling. The sound was deafening, as the plane has no insulation. (They provide earplugs for the wimps, but I didn't use them!)

We taxied and rolled down the runway. Linda was watching and thought it would never get off the ground, but at only 92mph it started to rise and we were airborne! What a thrill! I was a lad during WWII, but still have vivid memories of the B-17's and the B29's stationed at the local air base in Portland, Oregon, and after the war the B-17 they made into a gas station. (Which many years later contributed the top turret to Sentimental Journey.)

We slowly climbed out over the Oxbow Golf Course and down the lower Salt River. We rose to about 1500 feet and 120mph, the normal cruising speed (300 is the top rated speed). As we turned a sweeping left we were signaled (you couldn't be heard) to switch positions. I crawled back to the cockpit area and stood in the radioman's position behind the



pilot and co-pilot. We continued in a loop over Fountain Hills and then I moved to the rear of the plane, through the bomb bay. This was an exciting experience as the plane pitched from a bit of turbulence. You cross the bomb bay on a catwalk about 8 inches wide. There are chains along the side and a structural member in the middle to grab, but you couldn't help but remember the briefing warning that the bomb bay doors were designed to open at 100 pounds, so don't fall and don't worry about losing something. (I did - my cell phone holder, but not the phone!!)

We descended and soon were on the ground. Rolling what seemed like forever, but finally the hangar appeared through the window. We came to a stop and the pilots ran up the en-

gines to unload the oil. We disembarked and got our land legs back, having once again cheated death!

The flight was about 25 minutes, which was plenty for me, as they are not passenger seats. I can't imagine the brave young souls who spent 8 hours on bombing missions back in the forties. Thanks to my wife, Linda, I had a childhood dream come true!



The rest of the trip was great, but could never match the euphoria of the climb up the Coronado Trail. If you have never tried it - DO!




REMEMBER WHEN... By Gerry Goepfert
