


like glass shards. The sunlight's demise is still a matter of sadness for some of the hotel's staff members.



This is a postcard depicting the Desert View Trading Post on Highway 89 on Yarnell Hill. Zooming in on the picture severely, it looks as if the "woody" station wagon on the left is an early 60's Ford. The car on the right appears to be a 1963 (or thereabouts) Chevy. The right side sign on the restaurant appears to say "Stark Country Cured Hams and Bacon". The sign at the far left identifies the station brand as Texaco.

Yarnell Hill History

A LITTLE HISTORY OF YARNELL HILL, ONE OF OUR FAVORITE CORVETTE ROADS! BET YOU DIDN'T KNOW THIS....

A New Year's Eve storm in the early 1930s stranded many motorists at Desert View, a curve in the then-double lane road up and down Yarnell Hill where a gas station was located. The storm had deposited three feet of snow in just a few hours, and those going up couldn't get past Desert View or have room to turn around.

A little background includes the following:

- In the early 1900s, Phoenix folks had to go 72 miles by way of the Brill's Tank (now the Hassayampa River Preserve) through Wickenburg, over the Hassayampa, through Octave and Stanton and up to Yarnell to visit Prescott and points north. With the arrival of the automobile, the same trip became 140 miles because the road then went through Wickenburg, Congress Junction, Date Creek, Hillside and Kirkland to get to Yarnell and the ranching community of Peeples Valley.
- In 1926, the Yarnell Hill road was built ... a winding two lanes up Arizona's "Mont Blanc," which climbed 2,000 feet in four miles. It was paved in 1933.

- The other misplaced cargo. Terrified motorists and inexperienced truckers all have tales to tell of making the trip. White Elephant curve was the site of the majority of accidents.
- A cattle truck driver once lost his brakes but managed to save his new tractor by dragging the trailer side against the hillside. Another time, residents salvaged shoes that had been disgorged down the mountain from an accident, but they seldom found a matching pair. As for a load of whiskey, the feds arrived to guard it from thirsty locals. And some recall a load of eggs that survived to be sold by some for 25 cents a dozen, and eaten for a long time by many.
- The Desert View (now an outlook) was first used as a mule corral. After the gas station was added, frantic motorists would stop to find out what was wrong with their cooling systems. Model Ts would often burn out the front bearing that received no oil during the steep uphill climb. The mechanic got so he could change them in 50 minutes.
- Now, back to the snowy New Year's Eve at Desert View when two buses, one headed up and one down, were stranded, parked nose to nose, unable to go anywhere. The station owner sheltered many travelers in the station and took others to his nearby home. "They ate us out of just about everything we had," he recalled.





Corvettes on the Green - By Mark Bales





Including SCC member Mark Shaw's Warbonnet Yellow '72 (pictured at right), there were many beautiful Corvettes. One stood out for its rarity. In 1954 GM commissioned Model Builders, Inc. of Chicago to build twenty acrylic bubble tops for the Corvette. The chief engineer for the Electro-Motive division wanted a top with more headroom. Of the





twenty, only five were tinted, and one of those was presented at Julio G's. The tops were offered as a \$350 option. Since the price was over ten percent of the cost of the Corvette, few were ordered and the option dropped in 1955. This rare car is pictured at left. Takeda Thai - Our Tenth Ethnic Epicurean Experience!

We arrived early - at 6:00 p.m. - for the dinner at Takeda Thai Restaurant in Scottsdale on Saturday evening, March 27th. Moulay, the ownerchef was standing out front with one of his cohorts, and they greeted us in a very friendly manner. They had put orange cones in five parking spots out front to save the parking spaces for the Corvettes! Moulay pointed out his sporty Mercedes convertible parked in the yellow-striped "NO PARKING" zone in front of the restaurant.

Once we were seated inside, Moulay explained that all dishes are individually prepared using fresh ingredients, so we should not be impatient because this type of preparation takes extra time.

Once we had our drinks, we concentrated on appetizers. A wide assortment of appetizers was available - Jim and I had coconut shrimp - five plump perfectly cooked shrimp with a spicy dipping sauce. Others observed were tasting steamed black mussels, crab pockets, lettuce wraps, and numerous other small plates.

Having devoured the appetizers, we went on to choosing our main dishes. What a choice! There are many options. I tried the Pad Prik Khing, which is crispy green beans in a chile sauce with When Moulay asked me how hot I would like it from 1 to 4 with 4 being the hottest, I said 3. He said "A woman after my own heart!" I must tell you the Pad Prik Khing was delicious -I would definitely order it again. Other dishes observed and tasted were Thai Basil, Zesty Ginger, Firecracker Chicken, Pad Thai, Spicy Halibut (not so good from the eater's account) and Mahi Mahi with Crispy Skin in Lemon Sauce. Mark ordered the Mahi Mahi - which Jim got right away. When everyone else had been served, Moulay came around to check on how we were doing, and Jim said "What happened to Mark's Mahi Mahi?" Moulay was shocked that one dish had been forgotten. To make up for the oversight, he brought Mark a bowl with an artichoke heart in broth. Now we all know Mark is no vegetarian and artichoke heart is just not on his list of acceptable dishes, so Ben made the best of a

bad situation and ate it for Mark.



Because we had asked for, and been granted, separate checks, the payment process was a bit protracted, but I think we all would have to agree that Takeda Thai was an interest dining option. I for one would like to try it again.







Motorola CLS-1110 Two-Way Radio

The Scottsdale Corvette Club encourages members who attend monthly events, both one day and overnight trips, to purchase the Motorola CLS-1110 radio. Reasons are safety, caravan efficiency, and fun.

The lead Corvette can communicate route changes, rest stops, debris/ obstacles in the road, and safe passing.

In addition, the radios assist the lead and tail Corvettes in keeping the caravan together. This is critical in city traffic and traveling in unfamiliar areas.

The radios also allow participants to communicate with the lead Corvette. Participants can communicate mechanical problems or the need for an unplanned rest stop. If an individual or group becomes separated, they can easily reconnect with the caravan

The radios are also fun. Participants share quips, observations and information.

Why the Motorola CLS-1110? The CLS was designed for business use and is compatible with a previous radio used by many long term members. Please note the inexpensive Motorola radios vou find at the club stores are not compatible with the CLS-1110.

Where to find the CLS The Club has been unable to find a local supplier at a reasonable cost. The best bet is on-line. The current price on Amazon.com and B&H Photo is \$139. You may find a lower price through a search. One caution eBay often lists the CLS. Make sure it is NOT the Canadian model. They will not work here.

Once you purchase the radio, it will require programming to the SCC channel and frequency. We will provide the codes and assist in programming.

Is the CLS mandatory? The radio is not mandatory for Club membership. However, if you plan on attending the monthly activities, you will soon realize the radio will enhance the experience and provide a margin of safety.


LOOKING FOR THE LOST DUTCHMAN MINE




The Museum was filled with early Arizona artifacts of mining, and we went into the church that survived the fire at ApacheLand that they moved to the Museum site.




