join our Club, please let Mark Bales or any Board member know or simply invite them to join us at our next General Meeting!



CLUB MEMBERSHIP SURVEY SUMMARY

The Board would like to again thank the members (43) who participated in our recent annual Club satisfaction survey. This is the third year that that our Club has hosted the survey and the ratings continues to reflect a high rate of satisfaction from our members. Below you will find a full summary of the ratings on the individual survey questions over the past three years. In addition many members provided additional comments to help guide the Board as it continues to develop content and activities. However, the majority of the comments communicated a message of "don't change what we are doing because it is working just fine." And the Board will keep that in mind!

You will note that the ratings on the "food" and "value" at our Monthly Dinner Meetings continue to be the lowest scoring items. Not that they scored poorly, just well below all other items. We all want "top notch food" but also want reasonable pricing. The Board will continue to work with the management staff at Gainey Ranch to reach higher levels of satisfaction. It is worth repeating that the Club has spent many years exploring and experimenting with various venues for our Dinner Meetings. And, to date, Gainey Ranch continues to be our most desirable choice, based on our criteria.

The Board has established 10 basic criteria it looks for in a monthly meeting venue:

- Reasonably nice facility and amenities
- Good parking where our members are comfortable with the safety of their cars
- 3. Central Scottsdale location
- Private room without competing noise or distractions
- 5. Separate checks
- 6. Reasonable pricing
- 7. Reasonable quality of food
- Satisfactory service from management and staff
- Efficient ordering and payment processes
- Facility must be able to accommodate varying guest attendance from 20 to 50 guests

In addition, to help reduce to the cost to members, currently at about \$18 per person, the Club provides a small subsidy for each attendee (paid directly to the facility).

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



CORVETTE TECHNICAL INFORMATION

THE EVOLUTION OF THE CHEVY SMALL BLOCK ENGINE

As Chevrolet celebrates its 100th anniversary, I wanted to talk about the venerable Chev small-block and its evolution. On November 29, 2011 GM built the 100 millionth small-block V8. Think about that. 100 million! Wow!

It all started when GM recognized that its product lines, specifically the "stovebolt"216-cubic-inch inline 6 was, well, antiquated. In the 1954 Corvette the engine was upgraded to 235 cubic inches with aluminum pisteons and was referred to as the "Blue Flame 6." The V8 got its start after World War II, and GM produced an overhead-valve 331-cubic-inch engine for Cadillac in 1949 under Ed Cole's direction. Mr. Cole was transferred to Chevrolet, and he wanted to "stretch" development, meaning to be more compact, lighter and easier to manufacture.

In 1955 Chevrolet produced the 265-cubic-inch (3.75 inch bore + 3.00 inch stroke) displacement at 195 HP, and it was 50 pounds lighter and more powerful then the "stovebolt" six. Thereafter, the engine was referred to as the "small block." The real magic of this engine was its design, steel rocker arms that were hollow pushrods, sin-

gle piece intake, etc. Things that seem by today's standards to be "dated," were revolutionary 60 years ago.

Highlights:

- In 1957 the engine grew to 283 cubic inches with Rochester fuel injection.
- 1962 saw the engine again grow to 327 cubic inches and through the '60's had rated horsepower at 250, 200, 350 (these engines had hydraulic lifters), 365 (solid lifter Holly 850 cmf carb) and 375 (Fuelie).
- In 1969 the engine grew to 350 cubic inches and was used for about three decades in various GM products.
- Through the 70's the engine was detuned to as low as 165 HP (1975) and was the bane of many Corvette enthusiasts.
- 1986 saw the engine get revised to allow aluminum heads and one-piece crank shaft seal. It was called the "L98."
- In 1992 the GEN II or LT1 was born and rated at 300 HP and was offered in the '92 Corvette.
- In 1996 the LT4 version cranked out 330 HP and changed the cooling features from bottom up to top down (heads cooled first, then block).
- 1997 previewed the GEN III LS1 5.7 liter or 346 cubic inches instead of 350. The first time for aluminum block manufacturing and many changes in block structure and head design. This allowed

greater HP output in 1999 with the 385 HP Z06 and eventual 405 respectively, eclipsing the previous small-block benchmark of the 327 375 HP 65 I84 fuel-injected engine.

- 2005 saw the Gen IV 6.0 liter or 364 (CID) LS2.
 This engine had larger bores and different cam shaft positions. The LS7 version 427 CID yielded 505 HP.
- 2008 saw revisions to port sizes and dimensions between 376 CID LS3 and LS7.
- 2009 saw the pinnacle of small-block performance reached: 638 HP supercharged 6.2-liter engine in the ZR1.

The engine has been criticized as being low tech when compared to some of the more exotic engines. Well, the ZRI kicks a lot of asses on the track at about half the price of the more pricey performance cars.

So for me, give me the low-tech, small-block V8 HP output and low-end torque anytime - especially when I punch it and hear the roar of the engine and G forces...

Mark Bales' comments:

The LS2 and LS3 engines are very popular with hot rodders/customs. Ford and Chevy share that popularity, but if you notice, in recent years, lots of customs/hot rods, use the LS2 or LS3.

A small volume of exotics have used the Chevy small block over the decades. One I remember is the mid '60's Iso Grifo, see link: http://rickdebruhl.com/?p=320. I knew a guy in northwestern Indiana who owned one. Beautiful car, but the overall quality, over time, was lacking... Sucked. However, the one thing he never had a problem with was the motor: A small block Chevy Corvette.





On day two we drove to Scotty's Castle about 53 miles from Furnace Creek. We took the guided tour of this amazing mansion that was built between 1922-1931 by Albert Johnson, a civil engineer who designed it to be a vacation getaway home for him and his wife. Scotty (Walter Scott) never really owned the mansion he just convinced a lot of people that he did. Actually, Scotty was somewhat of a con man who befriended Albert Johnson and even had his own room in the castle. Johnson enjoyed Scotty's company and never really squelched the no-

tion that it was Scotty's Castle. It was really called Death Valley Ranch. The castle is a fascinating place and well worth the tour if you ever get the chance.

The roads in Death Valley are very good; winding with dips and long stretches where you can see for quite a distance. The speed limit is 55.....do you know where I'm going with this? After leaving Scotty's Castle, we headed to Stovepipe Wells for lunch and perhaps gasoline. We found ourselves going "slightly" over the speed limit, and when we stopped for everyone to regroup, we were joined by a park ranger who informed us we were, in fact, driving a little too

fast. He took all of our licenses, registrations, etc. and I think we were very fortunate in that we all (except for one) received a warning, and the fine received by the one was very modest compared to what it could have been. We dodged a bullet here!

At Stovepipe Wells we had lunch and one car purchased about a half tank of fuel. A discussion ensued on how far to next gas station and

how much gas the rest of us had. Based on the estimated distance (115 miles) to next gas stop, no one else fueled up....mistake! One car (Cassel) had a range of about 150 miles while two other cars had about 190-200 mile range. Well, about 145 miles down the road at some little "wide place" in the road with no gas station in sight and Cassel's car literally running on fumes, Walter was able to negotiate the purchase of about 2-3 gallons of gas from a guy in a pickup pulling an RV camper. Even though this gas look-









On May 14, that dream came true for 27 SCC members and 14 Corvettes. Would we be up to the challenge?



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

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Chicken, Sausage and Shrimp Jambalaya

As Served at the Mardi Gras Party at the Blooms' in February Recipe Courtesy of Kathy Bales

Makes enough to serve 6 to 8 people with leftovers

2 lbs. (or more) boneless chicken breasts

2 lbs. sausage (or more) (I use half and half sweet Italian and mild Italian)

2 lbs. extra large raw shrimp (or more)

6 cans Hunts tomato sauce

2 cups (or more) finely chopped onion

2 big green peppers finely chopped

1 cup finely chopped celery

5 cups chicken stock (I use low sodium)

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp ground thyme

1/2 tsp ground oregano

1/2 tsp ground red pepper

4 cloves fresh garlic finely chopped

Add olive oil to large stock pan. Throw all the veggies into the pan and sauté them. Once they are done, add the tomato sauce, the chicken stock and spices.


Simmer for a few hours. If it appears runny, add some corn starch to thicken.

Brown the chicken and sausage. I use my Calphalon grill with removable plates in lieu of pan browning. If you don't have a grill, then add olive oil to large frying pan. Once the pan is hot, lightly brown the chicken breasts. Then add more olive oil and lightly brown the sausage. Cut both into nice sized chunks once brown and dump into the sauce.

Before serving, simmer for another 2 to 3 hours, stirring occasionally, until meat is thoroughly done.

Add raw shrimp for about the last hour or until shrimp is fully cooked.

Serve with rice.
