The 400+ is basically stock and sells for \$11,500. Other engines put out from 450 HP to 1000 HP with prices ranging from \$13,500 to \$32,500.

These engines were developed by an engineer who works for Boeing in Mesa, Arizona, and are built in Gold Canyon, Arizona. They are very high-tech and built in a clean room that has restricted access.

Many of these engines are put into high-end sand rail cars.

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THE HOLLANDERS' DAY AT THE RACE TRACK

(Editor's Note: You may recall receiving an email in early February about a free PASA Driver's School (a \$150 value) to be held at Firebird Raceway on March 2nd and 3rd. The only charge was \$40 for a PASA membership, required for insurance coverage. When I found out that Steve and Ann Hollander were going to participate, I asked them to write an article for the newsletter, and here it is!)

"If a car spins out in front of you, aim your car right at it! It probably will shoot either right or left by the time you get there, so you won't likely hit it!" That's how the classroom instructor started our 8:00 a.m. Saturday morning class at Professional Autosports...

We were at the Firebird track, anticipating a fun day of Ann and me taking turns going fast in our C6 on the long oval track ("Firebird Course") which was displayed on the Internet as part of the materials for the Professional Autosports driving class. This 1.6 mile track appeared to have a straightaway of about a ½ mile, great for going fast safely, we thought. Well, it turned out that things were not exactly as expected. First off, there are 3 tracks at Firebird, and the one used for our class was the "East Track," a 1¼ mile track comprised of literally 10 turns, with only a very short straightaway. We wouldn't be testing the speed of our C6, but rather we will learn how to: brake going into a turn, maintain speed in the turn, and accelerate out of the turn prior to braking again before the next turn...great for my brakes and tire tread wear! And so the class continued with talk about the impor-

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tance of wearing the right kind of helmet (we had our son's motorcycle helmet), the suggestion that we might want to consider buying a flame-retardant suit, etc., etc., etc. Ann started to give me that look.... "So how do we gracefully exit this obvious mistake?" "That's ok honey, this could still turn out to be fun," I said. She wasn't buying it!

To continue...there were about 25 of us in the class with some 20 cars, mostly older Corvettes. One guy volunteered that he brought his Mazda to this class because he "didn't want to mess up his Corvette!" Cool! And so the class went on, with pointers about driving through the apex of each turn, positioning yourself for entering the next immediate turn (remember there are 10 turns to anticipate in each lap), being

sure to stay on the *left* of the short straightaway, yes the *left*, so that faster cars can pass you on the *right*... Oh, I forgot to mention...all 20 cars will be on this 1½ mile track at the same time, but don't worry, there will be some 20 seconds between each of us as we enter the track. Also, the class instructor tells us that each of us will have a volunteer instructor in the car with us, particularly for the first of four 20-minute heats. We can also have an instructor in the other 3 heats planned for the day, if we wish, he says...so Ann and I are feeling a lot better now!

It's now time for our first 20-minute heat. Ann is not yet convinced that this class is quite right for her...but she is still open to the idea. "You go first Steve!"

So, I'm in our C6, helmet on, lining up to have an instructor join me and then to enter the course. "Oh, it looks like we only have 3 instructors for this first heat (already in other cars), but you should be fine. Just remember the stuff we went over in the classroom this morning!" Cool!

So now I'm driving our shiny, ding-free C6, with some 19 other first-timers on the track, taking left and right turns, and not really knowing which cars in front or behind me have the 3 instructors...and generally not knowing what the **** I'm doing! That was fun!

Well, for the 2nd heat, I made sure I got an instructor. He had the flame-retardant suit on and told me about his profes-

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sional races in years past... I was stoked!

Well, after a couple of laps with me screwing up left and right, he "suggested" that I let him drive so that he can show me how it's done. Sure! Man he was good, cutting through the apexes and all.... OK Steve, it's your turn again... I think I got the instructor to start sweating again... or perhaps to take up drinking!

The good news is that both Ann and I got our Professional Autosports "High Performance and Defensive Driving" diplomas in the mail soon afterwards. This means that we are now both qualified to take our C6 onto the track at Firebird to drive in more heats. In fact, I think that we graduated from the Novice Red group to the Intermediate Orange group! I'm stoked!

P.S. In case you're wondering, Ann chose to opt out from participating in this experience!

2008 Corvette Announced!

GM took the opportunity to unveil the 2008 Corvette during the annual Birthday Bash in Bowling Green, April 27th. The biggest news is the new LS3 engine, optional dual-mode exhaust, improved shifting and interior upgrades.

Here are excerpts from the official GM press release:

Jetstream Blue Metallic

Here's a look at the new and enhanced features for '08 Corvette models:

Engine - A new, 6.2L LS3 small-block V-8 is the standard engine in Coupe and Convertible models. It is rated at 430 horsepower and 424 lb.-ft. of torque with the standard exhaust system; with the new, optional two-mode exhaust system, power ratings increase to 436 horses / 325 kW and 428 lb.-ft. / 592 Nm. As a result, the standard Corvette is true supercar, capable of 190 mph. The LS3 with the six-speed paddle-shift automatic is the fastest automatic-

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Crystal Red Metallic vs. Monterey Red

equipped Corvette ever, with 0-60 mph capability of 4.3 seconds.

Exhaust system - Optional on '08 Coupe and Convertible models is a new, two-mode performance exhaust system. Similar in design and function to the system used on the Z06, the dual-mode exhaust uses vacuum-actuated outlet valves, which control engine noise during low-load operation, but open for maximum performance during high-load operation. It is not identical to the Z06 system; the Coupe/Convertible uses a 2.5-inch-diameter exhaust, while the Z06 uses a three-inch system.

With the new, dual-mode performance exhaust, power output for Coupe/Convertible rises from 430 horsepower

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(321 kW) and 424 lb.-ft. of torque (575 Nm) to 436 horses (325 kW) and 428 lb.-ft. (580 Nm). This system gives the Corvette a more aggressive exhaust sound character that will appeal to performance enthusiasts.

<u>Transmissions and axle ratios</u> - The shifting efforts for both the six-speed manual transmission and paddle-shift six-speed automatic transmissions have been improved in '08 Corvette models. The manual transmission shifting improvements include a more positive and direct feel during gear changes, with better gate-to-gate location.

The six-speed paddle-shift automatic transmission on Coupe and Convertible is improved with new hardware and a new controller calibration that deliver quicker shifts. This change bolsters the feeling of performance and driver control when using the shifting paddles.

Also new for '08 models is the availability of the 2.73 performance axle ratio with the automatic transmission. It is included with the Z51 package..

<u>Wheels</u> - Corvette Coupe and Convertible models come with a new split-spoke wheel design for '08. The design was introduced on the limited-edition '07 Indianapolis 500 Pace Car replicas with a Sterling Silver finish. The standard 18-inch front wheels and 19-inch rear wheels feature a Sparkle Silver finish, with a Competition Gray version optional.

Also new is a distinctive, performance-oriented forged aluminum wheel for Coupe and Convertible. It comes in a polished finish.

What's New for Corvette?

Exterior colors - There are two new premium exterior colors available with 2008 Corvette models: Jetstream Blue Metallic Tintcoat and Crystal Red Metallic Tintcoat; they replace Le Mans Blue Metallic and Monterey Red Metallic Tintcoat.

<u>Custom Leather-Wrapped Interior Package</u> - Available on Coupe, Convertible and Z06 models, the new Custom Leather-Wrapped Interior Package offers a stylish, two-tone leather-appointed cabin with details that enhance the feeling of Corvette's craftsmanship. Details include:

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and more!! It was great. If you'd like to see what you missed, you can see pictures of the restaurant and view a typical dinner menu at www.levaullauris.com.














Palm Springs Follies Trip

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THE COPPERSTATE 1000

Arizona is blessed with magnificent scenic beauty and great driving roads. As members of the Scottsdale Corvette Club, Debbie and I have driven Arizona highways as part of many Corvette caravans and we always appreciate the excellent organization that goes into the planning of SCC activities. At the request of our newsletter editor, I will attempt to provide some personal background and an insight to the organization of the Copperstate 1000; a car-related driving event with Arizona roots.

April 14-18, 2007 marked the 17th annual running of the Copperstate 1000 vintage road rally. The event hosted by the Men's Arts Council started in 1991as a fund raiser to benefit Phoenix Art Museum. The Copperstate continues to attract

participants from all over the country as well as numerous foreign countries. It seems the interest is as strong as ever to drive a vintage car in the southwest desert.

Prior to my role as chairman of the Copperstate 1000 rally for 2007 and 2008, I served in many varied capacities as a committee member for 6 years. This involvement and time commitment, in part, accounts for my recent absence in the SCC. Debbie and I have been Corvette club members for eight years and having held the positions of newsletter editor and Vice President of SCC we have many fond memories. Recently Debbie and I have reverted back to the ownership of classic/vintage automobiles and we make a point of driving our vintage cars and participate in 3-4 rallies a year across the country. In September of 2005 we put 3800 miles on our 1966 Corvette in one month on two back-to-back rallies driv-

ing across Montana and California. That Corvette performed great. It is our desire to participate in the Mille Miglia rally in Italy as drivers within the next couple of years. In mid-May we will be in Brescia, Italy for the third year in a row hosting a tour that combines the Mille Miglia rally, visits to the Ferrari and Lamborghini factories and access to some private car collections scattered throughout Northern Italy. The trip is balanced in its driving by scheduled time in the Tuscany and Umbria regions, Florence, Venice, Milan and Bologna to do what most people who visit Italy do - sample the local cuisine and wine while taking in the non-automobile-related sights.

Back to the Copperstate 1000 rally. SCC's Mike Cassel and Mark Shaw played key roles in the 2007 Copperstate. Mike is treasurer of the event and director of the fund-raising auction, and Mark was in charge of mechanical check-in/vehicle registration making sure the 80 cars entered were road worthy before being allowed to participate. As we all know, Mike and Mark are avid automotive enthusiasts and both are eager to lend a hand if cars are involved.

Logistically, there are a lot of moving parts associated with the execution of an 80-car vintage road rally and the 220 people traveling with Copperstate for four days throughout the



State of Arizona. A crew of four mechanics each with some expertise in a particular marque provide support should a car

fall short of finishing the 1000 mile journey under its own power. A rolling shop on wheels is not far behind. The custom trailer is stocked with essentials that over the years we have come to realize as necessary staples to support



old age. AAA of Arizona provides three flatbed trailers. The



title sponsor, Bell Lexus provides six brand new Lexus vehicles for those that develop unrepairable mechanical issues in route. Some Copperstate participants even bring there own crews to accompany their prized possessions - just in case.

We also have an escort of eight DPS motorcycle officers that accompany the entire rally. The Family Support Fund for the officers is one of the benefit charities. The lodging requirements for the entourage of participants, support crew and staff are 110 rooms and because of this large number, it is

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often necessary to book entire hotels; small towns force us to book multiple hotels. Food is catered for some of the special meals. All food and drinks are included for 5 days. A luggage truck with handlers arrives in each town in advance of the rally cars, and all luggage is in the rooms and ready upon arrival. Some Corvettes don't have trunks!

Cars were meant to be driven and rallies have gained in popularity as the healthy trend of driving the older cars continues. Two Corvettes I regret not driving more were a 1964 fuel-injected coupe and a 1971 LT1 convertible. They sat covered in the garage most of the time.

This year two participating cars were shipped from England by their owners, the oldest being a 1924 Bentley 3.8 litre and a 1952 Nash Targa Florio. My car, a recently purchased 1967 Ghia 450 SS arrived from Belgium just nine days before the rally began. Only 52 of these cars were produced in its

one-year model run of 1967. The most expensive car to have participated in the Copperstate was a 1961 Ferrari 330TR LM. This race car won its class in the 1962 Le Mans and came in 5th overall. It will be auctioned off at the Ferrari Factory this month in Italy with the estimated price being \$8,000,000 - \$10,000,000. Usually the cars range in value from \$40,000 to \$4,000,000, and each year a handful of Corvettes attend, usually C1's and C2's. This year a 1969 427 broke down on day one and was quickly sent home to Florida. The other five Corvettes finished with no mechanical problems.

The entry fee is \$4750 and the eligibility requirements are for cars of pre-1973 model year. Only half of the applicants that apply can be accommodated. Some applicants have been on the waiting list for three years.

The cars and the people are great and the experience is memorable. A few participants have come every year for 17 years!

The DC Ranch Marketplace was the site of the April Vette Vixens' dinner. We met at Sol y Sombre, a new Spanish restaurant located upstairs on Market Street. Parking was a big of a challenge, as "the world" was at the Marketplace on Wednesday evening, April 18. It was a chilly, windy evening and not suitable for outdoor dining, although Sol y Sombre has

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a big beautiful patio overlooking Market Street, as you can see from the picture at the bottom of the prior page.

There were thirteen of us in attendance - the most we've had in a long time! We ordered drinks - mojitos, sangria, wine. I must tell you that the mojito was not as impressive as the one I had at Trader Vic's a few months ago.

The menu is extensive. The specialty is tapas, or small plates. The prices are reasonable. I think ev-

eryone had at least two items from the menu, and some may have had three. I was tempted to order three myself, but resisted, and a good thing I did as there was plenty to eat. As you'll see from the picture above, the dishes are very interestingly shaped and each food item is served on a particular type of dish.

The menu has a few exotic items that we didn't try, such as red-wine braised octopus and snails and artichokes in parsley broth. But the things we did try were wonderful. Barb had a potato and egg dish, kind of like a tart, that was marvelously flavorful. Several people had gambas which are giant prawns. Sandi had a pear with goat cheese salad that I coveted. A cou-

ple of other salads sounded interesting: the bibb lettuce with manchego cheese and spiced almonds, and the fennel and sour orange salad. Several people ordered the trout and the veal dishes. I ordered the grilled artichoke with garlic aioli and the mussels which were in a thick sauce with chickpea fritters on the side. Both dishes were outstanding!

The service was quite good. Our only complaint was the manager who came around when we were all seated and announced that they would be unable to give us separate checks, even though Dorothy had fully discussed the separate check issue when making and confirming the reservations. He said it would cause our food to be brought out sporadically instead of all together at one time, and that if we divided into tables of four, it would make serving easier and keep the kitchen on track much better. Unfortunately, he didn't come by later to see how things went as far as the service or the food, because we would have had to tell him that the food delivery was extremely sporadic, and as the waitress explained, the dishes come out of the kitchen as they are prepared, not in any particular order. Dorothy did not receive anything at all, while the rest of us all had at least one dish, and some received two before she got her first dish. So much for inefficient service caused by separate checks!

The good things were: the service was pleasant; the food was excellent; and the cost was quite reasonable - my dinnerincluding one mojito came to just over \$30 not including the gratuity.

I think we all agreed that Sol y Sombre was an interesting eating experience and one that we would love to experience again. There are a number of dishes on the menu that I would love to try if the opportunity arises.






