Remember, these dinners are usually reasonably priced and are about trying new and different types of food. Mark your calendar now so you won't miss out on this fun evening.






We departed the MGM at 9am Monday, and other than one 90 degree, right angle turn so we

We did take one planned detour to visit Dante's View which is 5,000' above the Death Valley floor. It reminded me of one of our trips to Israel, when we entered that country from Jordan. On our way from southern Jordan to the north, we stopped at Mt. Nebo, where Moses looked across the Jordan Valley into the Promised Land, being able to see across the Jor-

dan Valley to what would become Masada and all
the way up to the Sea of Galilee. We had a
similar panoramic view at Dante's View, being
able to see all the way across Death Valley and

many miles north and south. A fabulous view of that national park!

After lunch, we traveled about 40 miles north to Scotty's Castle, which was built in the early 1900's. The real name of this "Castle" is the "Death Valley Ranch," so named by the actual owner, Albert and Bessie Johnson. "Walter Scott often told reporters that it was his 'shack' or 'castle.' While it was the Johnsons who financed the grandiose project, it was Scott who added the mystery, curiosity and entertainment... Winters at the 3,000 foot elevation can still be cool, even here in the desert. Buildings were heated by a combination of an oil-fired furnace, stoves and fireplaces. However, most of the 14 fireplaces on the Castle grounds appear to have been used more for atmosphere than heating. Need for firewood introduced a major problem as it was a scarce and expensive item in the desert. Johnson solved the problem by making the best of a bad situation when the local Bullfrog Goldfield Railroad was abandoned in 1928. Loss of the rail link was a major setback, but Johnson was able to buy over 120,100 wooden crossties

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for only \$1,500. However the cost of transporting the ties to the Castle (20 miles) came to an additional \$25,000. Despite the expense, Johnson had all the firewood he would need for years to come, in fact, hearly one third of them still remain on the property."

After traversing the 40 miles back to the south, we landed in the Stovepipe Wells Motel. This majestic edifice reminded Bev and me of a motel on the west side of the Sea of Galilee named the Hartman Hotel. It was so bad that we named it 'The Horrible Hartman." The Stovepipe and the Hartman had very similar accommodations: no telephone, no TV, no hair blower, etc., etc. - and God forbid - no casino!! Let's just say it was quaint. But, because we didn't have the normal accourrements, we had to talk to one another - which proved to be more entertaining than a stage show anyway. A good time was had by all, and we all got to bed early, too.

It's a one-way road, being only about 8 or 9 feet wide in some places. Barely wide enough for our rearview mirrors! Our tour guide Walter got a "star" for that diversion.





TRIP TO KITT PEAK OBSERVATORY **APRIL 19, 2008**

We had an early meeting time for our trip to Tucson as we had quite a bit of mileage to cover. Six Corvettes set off from Chandler Mall, down the 202 to head to I-10 south to Tucson. Unbeknownst to us, the freeway was completely blocked at that intersection, so we had return to the mall, and take another route to I-10 South. Good thing we met early! We sped south as quickly as we could (which was very quickly on some stretches) and without a bathroom break (a record for this club) made it to Kitt Peak Ob-

Who said it doesn't pay to attend SCC meetings?

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For those of you who have not made the trip before, Kitt Peak Observatory is located 56 miles southeast of Tucson on the Tohono O'odham Reservation off State Route 86. Kitt Peak was selected in 1958 as the site for a national observatory, and home to the largest collection of telescopes. Kitt Peak has 25 optical and 2 radio telescopes.



The Mayall 4 meter telescope is one of the largest in the world. It is 18 stories high and can be seen just below the summit from over 50

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miles away. The telescope was finished in 1970. The dome weighs 500 tons and has a double shell. The structure can withstand hurricane force winds of 150 miles per hour. The primary mirror weighs 15 tons. There are 4 more requests for telescope time than there are clear nights in a year.



The Mayall telescope was not open the day we were there, as the winds were becoming quite strong. We did go into the 2.1 meter visitor area and had a presentation by one of the docents giving tours. We were not able to look thru the telescope, but you can make reservations to see through the telescope on certain

evenings. If it is real windy they close the shells as objects can blow in and damage the mirrors if it is real windy.




BOOK REVIEW

About 6 months ago my book club decided to read "The Last Chinese Chef" by Nicole Mones. I had never read any of her other books, but she was the author of "Lost in Translation" which was made into a movie. I liked "Lost in Translation" but I did not love it, so I was a bit skeptical when I started this book.

The book's main character is Maggie, who we find out in the very beginning is a widowed American food writer still grieving one year after her husband's death. She is informed there is a claim against her late husband's estate and has to leave for Beijing right away, as a Chinese woman is claiming her child is Maggie's husband's child. Maggie asks for time off to investigate this matter, however her editor tells her there is a new rising Chinese American culinary star named Sam Liang in Beijing she should meet while in China. She is assigned the task of writing about Sam and the imperial style restaurant he will be soon opening.

Maggie goes to China and spends significant time with Sam and his extended family of uncles, etc, who are also accom-



plished cooks. He shows her how he cooks, and why he does what he does, and Chinese food is described in a way that I have never seen before! Sam's description's of the food he cooks intertwines with social and food histories of China, and the intricacies of the cooking of the food are amazing At the same time Maggie learns more about the child supposedly fathered by her husband.

This is a wonderful story, and many of you have heard me talking of this book. It was a book about travel in China, and you feel as if you really get into the culture of the area. While reading this book my mouth was often watering for the incredible dishes that were being cooked by Sam and I wished I could have been transported right then to eat some of that delicious food. If you enjoy travel, and you enjoy reading about food, you are really going to enjoy this book as it gave me a whole new understanding of China, its people and their food. And you may no longer be happy with your local Chinese restaurant!
