





### 15th Anniversary Celebration

On September 9, 2014 over 70 members gathered at Gainey Ranch Golf Club to celebrate the Club's 15-year anniversary. Planning for the event began a year ago, when Past Presidents Mark Bales, Mike Cassel, Manny Siprut and Ken Harder were part of a sub-committee and tasked to make recommendations for the event to the full Board. The full Board made some tweaks, and away we went. And what a night it turned out to be!

An excellent buffet (heavily subsidized by the Club) included Roast Sirloin, Salmon Medallions, Spinach and Cheese Ravioli, Herbed Red Potatoes, Grilled Zucchini and Yellow Squash, Southwest Caesar Salad, and Warm Rolls and Butter. Gainey also outdid themselves with an Anniversary Cake (see photo on the previous page) beautifully decorated with the Corvette emblem! 

# TRIP TO GILA HOT SPRINGS, NEW MEXICO - SEPTEMBER 2014 Story by Frank Tasnadi - Photos by Mark Bales & Fran Harder

The latest Scottsdale Corvette Club event started out like many others, meeting at the Indian Bend retail center and heading out from there. Destination: The Gila Cliff Dwellings in New Mexico. So on a sunny Thursday morning five Corvettes (Mark and Kathy Bales, Walter and Michele Juessen, Dorothy Durby, Ken and Fran Harder, and Frank and Lisa Tasnadi) led by Walter and Michele and their 638-horsepower ZR1 rocket on the Arizona open road toward New Mexico and our eventual destination of Pinos Altos, NM.

Traveling out the US 60 east to Globe seemed pretty routine, but I thought to myself: how can five shiny Corvettes, filled with nine fun loving people and a slightly cooler but sunny fall-ish day be routine? Conclusion: It can't. This trip was a winner from the very beginning!! Sliding through Globe we pointed our bumpers towards Safford, AZ. In between we encounter some rather straight, lonely, fairly level roads. It's Walter in front, then Ken and me with the others a little bit behind. All of a sudden I wonder what is wrong with my car, seems to be running smoothly, but I am losing ground - big time to the leaders as they pull away into the distance. It didn't take long to realize the two in front of me had nailed their respective accelerators and were speeding away. There was nothing wrong with my car

...me maybe, but not the car. So in a somewhat delayed reaction, I too nailed it, bringing my C7 to 112 (a PR in thenew car) before catching the two hot doggers in front of me who had by now slowed down. Later conversation discovered Walter made it to 150+ and Ken to 125, both slowing because the road conditions worsened quickly. We may be fast but we are not foolish!

We had lunch in Safford at La Tienda Del Sol, another great little restaurant. We all wondered aloud....how does Walter do it...almost always picking greatplaces to eat? Onward to Lordsburg, NM and eventually Silver City. Everyone is doing well. We are creeping along (seems like it after 100+ earlier) through Silver City when Dorothy gets on the radio: "My car is making funny noises." We pull into a parking lot almost immediately, pop the hood, looks good, underneath...nothing wrong...hmmm. After a short deliberation, we decide to keep driving, miraculously the noise went away just as mysteriously as it began. Later we discovered the noise came and went coincidently along with the loud, large group of cicadas doing their thing in the local woods next to our highway. A slightly red-faced Dorothy admitted...probably nothing wrong with the car.:)

We arrive at our first hotel - actually it was a group of very nice log cabins - around 5:00 p.m. There to meet us were Chuck and Sandi Weschler. They had driven up from their summer place in Flagstaff to join us. Everyone was tired but excited to be in the tall trees with the smell of pine in the 72 degree fresh air....awesome!! The Bear Creek Motel and Cabins is our home for the next two nights. The cabins are rustic but clean 2-story units with the sleeping quarters upstairs. They have everything you need including cable HD TV and free WIFI. Although the latter was painfully slow, it still was free. Happy hour on the Juessen's patio and off to dinner. The Buckhorn Saloon, Restaurant and Opera House....yes, you heard that right...Opera House...was

about a mile away, too far to walk. Like the cabins, the Buckhorn is quaint and rustic but very nice and friendly. The menu was well rounded with steaks, chops, seafood, etc. available. Friday's and Saturday's feature prime rib but as this was Thursday we opted for the other menu items. Everyone's food was good, especially considering we are in the middle of nowhere! We decided to make reservations for

the next night too. We also made an appointment to tour the Opera House, and it turns out it is a **haunted** Opera House!

The highlight for the next day was to be our trip to the Gila Cliff Dwellings, more on those in a moment. To get there we had to travel about 35 miles on The Trail of the Mountain Spirits Scenic Byway...aka ...NM Highway 15. Well, this isn't really what I would call a typical highway. It is very curvy and narrow with countless tight turns and elevation changes along the way. It is heavily wooded, giving the road surface a strobe light effect as you drive. I love it...the entire thing, strobe and all!! If you have ever done the Road to Hana on Maui you know what this is like, except this has much greater elevation changes. It is supposed to take two hours to complete the journey, but they don't know SCC

The Cliff Dwellings were indeed very special. Seven caves on the face of a cliff were first inhabited in 1276. The inhabitants are known as the Puebloans of the Mogollon area. Geronimo was reportedly born nearby at the "Headwaters of the Gila." To get





there, we had to hike. Initially Walter said it was an 18-mile round trip hike, but the smile on his face quickly gave it away. It was a guided or self-guided tour with the entire thing lasting a little over an hour. We then took the obligatory trek to the gift shop, and finally we are on our way back to NM 15 and its curves...yippee...I can't wait!! 

# 2014 National Corvette Museum (NCM) Caravan Trip By John Ketterl

One item on our bucket list was to travel as much of America's Road, US Route 66, as possible. After we bought our 1988 dark red metallic Corvette convertible in April 2012, my wife, Gloria and I, heard about the NCM's 20th Anniversary that was scheduled for August 22-29, 2014. The event included caravans of Corvettes that would travel from all over the USA to Bowling Green, KY to celebrate this 5-year event. We felt this was a great opportunity to fulfill this bucket list item so, in November 2013, we registered to participate in the Southwest Caravan that included sub-caravans from AZ/NM, NM, TX and OK to travel east to end up in Bowling Green KY, the GM assembly plant for all new Corvettes.

Early on, the NCM set up an online chat server for the participants to communicate anything and everything related to the caravan including what to bring, what to

wear, side venues and trips, radio and communications, and much, much more. This was an enormous help since we were newbies to caravan travel and needed some guidance about what was the most important stuff to load into our huge 1' X 2' X 1' shoe-box-sized rear compartment in our C4. (The fact is, we almost bought a C5 on the trip solely because of the larger size trunk space, but that is another story.)

After a briefing at 10 AM on Friday August 22 at Midway Chevrolet by the AZ/NM caravan leader, Holt Davis, about the rules of the caravan and what to expect and what not to expect, we started off to Williams AZ around noon. The AZ/NM caravan started earlier that day in Tucson and traveled to Phoenix where more cars joined the armada. At this point we were about 22 cars, give or take a few. The intent was to travel to Williams to meet up with a larger caravan, the SoCal/SoNev group, which started from Ontario, CA earlier that day. This caravan was joined in Las Vegas by more Corvettes and totaled about 150+ cars when they pulled into Williams. With the addition of the AZ/NM cars in Williams, the caravan grew to about 180 cars.

The town of Williams really went out of their way to welcome the combined caravan to their community. They set up the eastbound US Route 66 street with reserved parking for Corvettes, only to allow the proud owners to show off their personal chariots to the town

folks and other chariot owners. The town opened their doors to the caravan participants with discounts, coupons and other incentives to utilize the local establishments including eateries, bars, and antique shops of all sorts and even set up a band to serenade the Corvette chariot owners.

The next morning, all 180 Corvettes lined up on west-bound US Route 66, three abreast, for a police escort thru town to allow the town residents a final review of all the cars before they left town. This final parade traveled west to the western edge of Williams to a turnabout then reversed direction using eastbound one-way US Route 66 to join Interstate 40 heading east to our next stop of Albuquerque, NM, 340 miles away.

Traveling through Flagstaff, Winslow (and don't forget Winona), Two Guns, St. Joseph, and Holbrook, AZ, was a fascinating trek that bought back memories of trips past when we were much younger. The organizers of the caravan encouraged side trips to the Meteor Crater, the Painted Desert or the Petrified Forest. The pace of the caravan was about the speed limit so spending a little time at one or more of these places was possible.

After an hour and a half lunch break in Gallup, NM, the caravan headed eastward again. Glo and I decided to eat at a truck stop east of Gallup that conveniently included a gas fill-up as well as a blue plate lunch. While pumping gas for the thirsty Vette, one of the gas station

patrons, who had traveled from California, was astonished at the number of Corvettes that passed him (he counted more than 20 that passed him one after another at one time), and he said he was psyched to buy a Corvette when he gets home to Albuquerque. It just shows that success in numbers has a very strong influence in swaying how people react.

Traveling east from Gallup was gorgeous with the red-orange mesas and canyons against a cobalt blue sky. Traveling through Grants and Laguna, NM, with their obvious Native American heritage was an experience that many in the USA would really enjoy. Albuquerque could be seen beneath the Sandia Mountains from a few miles out of town. After checking into the hotel, the evening festivities included another showing off of our chariots at the Reliable Chevrolet dealership. These hosts provided a DJ with period appropriate tunes, read 60's and 70's music, with some great finger food. In Albuquerque, the caravan increased in size by more than 20 cars from northern New Mexico and El Paso, TX areas.

The next morning, after a hotel sponsored buffet breakfast, all of the 200 or so Corvettes lined up, this time 4 abreast on pavements that surrounded 2 of the larger host hotels, for the trek to Amarillo, TX. This time, the caravan left I-40 a few miles east of Albuquerque and traveled northward though the east side of the Sandia Mountains on SR14. This leg went though various smaller towns some of which are artist colonies. The slower pace allowed for some scenic views of the east side of the Rio Grande Valley with some country-style roads and amenities.

We made it to I-25 near Santa Fe (we broke from the caravan to get some gas) and followed it for about 60 miles to US Route 84 trying to catch up with the rest of the caravan which was a futile effort. We exited the interstate at this point and headed toward Santa Rosa, NM. The great part of this leg of the trip was that it was a straight 2-lane road with virtually no town speed traps to limit the speedometers of the pack. I was told that, at one point, the leader of the caravan opened up his yellow C6 to 130 MPH for several miles just to let the car breath in the clear high desert air - to clean their pipes, so to speak. My C4 wasn't that fast but doing 85 to 90 on this rural stretch did nothing to catch up with these 2-lane highway Corvette daredevils. We joined I-40 again just west of Santa Rosa to travel east for lunch in Tucumcari, NM.

After lunch at a 1950's style diner in Tucumcari and fresh gas (read that however you want), we headed east for Amarillo, TX, our next overnight stop. This leg was mostly prairie for scenery with the sporadic sightings of wind turbines that provide electrical energy for the Southwest including Arizona Public Service customers.

Just outside of Amarillo is the Cadillac Ranch with the 10 half-buried Cadillacs that attract worldwide visitors each year.

The evening events in Amarillo consisted of a host hotel opening up their patio to the caravan participants for hors d'oeuvres and a box lunch provided by the local Amarillo Corvette club. By this time, the caravan totaled more than 250 cars due to meeting up with the Oklahoma/Texas Panhandle Caravan group in Amarillo. At this point, the caravan leadership was turned over to Tuna Dobbins and his wife, Susan, from Oklahoma. Their task was to lead the group the next day to Tulsa, OK, and then to Cape Girardeau, MO. The day after that, the larger caravan would travel to Nashville and then to Bowling Green.

Unfortunately, instead of heading east with the caravan, we had to leave the caravan in Amarillo and return to Phoenix for a previous commitment. However, the caravan experience was great for both my wife and me. We met some of the nicest and most courteous people ever. My hat goes off to all the organizers who spent 4 years preparing for the trip by traveling the roads and personally experiencing the local cuisine and staying at the hotels before the caravan registration was even set up. Each registered participant was given a fantastic travel booklet that contained turn by turn directions and colored Google Maps with notations about how to get to

hotels and other events during the caravan trip.

The organizer/leader of the Southern California caravan, Hib Halverson, the leader of the SW caravan, has been the captain for 3 of these NCM caravans and would like new blood to spearhead the next 25th NCM anniversary caravan. Hib did a phenomenal job of getting the local captains together to organize this event. Holt Davis was the captain of the AZ/NM caravan, and his yellow C6 had all the antennas, decals and markings of any road rally These two gentlemen, and Tuna Dobbins, know more about racing cars including Mustangs, Roadrunners and Corvettes, than anyone I know. I had the good fortune to sit with Tuna and Holt in Amarillo, and these two old street racing buffs spent more than an hour and a half reminiscing about the cars they once owned and what they did to them to add even one more horse power just to beat some teenage hot-shot on the street!!

Tony Megowan spent 3 or 4 months, straight, volunteering his time and resources to develop and put the Route Book together including the Google maps with color glossies. His wife Paula acted as the CFO and was the primary contact for gathering sponsors to help finance the event. There were countless others that contributed significant time and energy to making this caravan event a success. My kudos to all these folks for making the event that much more fun and enjoyable.

### 2014 NCM Caravan

Although it may be too early to tell at this point, I know I will be ready to do another caravan based on the experience we had on this recent trip. I hope the 2019 NCM caravan comes soon as I would really like to take the full trip to Bowling Green.

member who decided to bring their car and agreed to stay the entire day (9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.) was given free tickets to the event, including their car mate.



Also participating were top female polo players including Sunny Hale (U.S.), Sarah Wiseman (Great Britain), Paolo Martinez (Argentina), and the top professional gay polo player in the world, Caroline Anier of France. This international cast of players highlights both the importance and significance of this event, which has become the premier polo event in the United States. Sunday's action included two polo matches, with Team Heineken defeating Sears Vacation Team 5-4 for the Governor's Cup. And in the best match of the weekend, the all-star match, Team Bentley defeated Team Barrett Jackson 6-5.

Don't know anything about Polo? Well, some background. It certainly is a rich person's game, as many



players own many very expensive horses. The reason you need lots of horses is that each horse is only used for one chukka, which is essentially equivalent to a quarter of a period in other sports. Each team consists of just four players, and in a match, they play 4 chukka of 7 minutes each. Once a goal is scored, the teams change ends. There is no goalie and a goal is scored when the hard plastic ball is shot by a player through two poles which look like football goal posts without the crossbar. The idea is to score more goals than your opponent, and the player usually hits the ball from the right side of his horse. There are certain fouls that can be called, and there are two referees on horseback monitoring the play. The field can be 300 yards long and as much as 200 yards wide, and at halftime, it is tradi-

tion that the audience come onto to the field and tramp down the grass kicked up by the fast running and turning horses. Of course, it is always wise to watch where you are walking so that you do not tramp down the horse pooh! Our reserved seats were right along the field's edge, and our group enjoyed both the polo and the opportunity to people watch.

Champagne is the drink of choice, and the polo match may be the least interesting thing going on at any point in time. Sunday's activities capped a weekend that included previews of the Barrett-Jackson Collector Car Auction, the Scottsdale Arabian Horse Show, the First Canine Couture Fashion Show (yes, dog

fashion), the LIVE Larsen Art Auction, the World's Longest Catwalk Fashion Show (yes, cat fashion), and Horse Chip Bingo (don't ask!), benefitting Phoenix Children's Hospital. What a day, what an experience, and what great fun!

# Advanced Driving Experience at Bob Bondurant School of High Performance Driving

Each wheel can be raised to reduce drive wheel or front wheel traction, simulating driving on wet/icy surfaces. Challenging enough without help from a "friend."

If you haven't done this, and it comes around next year, I recommend it. If you don't belong to AAA, find a friend who does.


