Editor's Comment: I received the following email from Larry on April 26, 2014, and wanted to share it with you all. Larry had a special place in all our hearts with his enthusiasm for Corvettes. When he bought the Corvette pictured above and I found out about it, I asked him to share some information for the newsletter. Here is what he wrote:

"Hi Dorinne, last night the Sorces and the Blooms had a photo shoot and Krysha sent the "evidence." Did you receive it?

"A little story -

"On October 3, 1963, for my birthday (which is really the 4<sup>th</sup>) I ordered a new 1964 white Stingray roadster with a black top and interior. I was 23 years old at the order date. Was I excited!! The car arrived a week before Thanksgiving. Had a 327/300 with a 4-speed.

"On October 3, 2013, for my birthday (which is still the 4th) I ordered a new 2014 Stingray coupe. You can do the math. I was 73 years old at the order date. Was I excited!! As it turns out, the dealer's allocation was very limited and I waited almost three months and nothing coming. In bemoaning my fate to Father Ken Harder, he suggested I contact Chuck Mullins at Van Chevrolet. He was great; took the order on January 20, 2014. The base Torch Red 2LT, with a black interior, automatic, chrome wheels, NPP exhaust, Z51 spoiler, and premium carpet mats arrived on March 18th.

"At 73 I am more excited about a new Stingray than I was 50 years ago!!



# 2018 C7 PRODUCTION RUN SHORTEST IN 60 YEARS?

# WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT THE ZR1 AND C8...

Let's say you ordered your new 2018 Corvette and you receive a TPW (targeted production week) of January 1, 2018. On average your brand new car should be in your driveway in late January, 2018. Enjoy it while you can. A month later, your neighbor might have a "brand new" 2019 Corvette sitting in his driveway. Your new 2018 depreciated one model year in less than a month.

GM rocked the Corvette world on October 12, when they announced the following:

- · Final orders for the 2018 ends the week of November 16 (normal cycle, orders would end Spring '18).
- · Order books for the 2019 will arrive around November 20th.
- · 2019 Corvette ordering begins November 30th.
- · 2019 production will begin the end of January.

Adding to the confusion, GM announced that other than a paint choice or two, there will be no changes from the 2018 to the 2019. Of course, expect some "limited edition" to take over from the Carbon 65. We also wonder if "no changes" also means no 10-speed auto, as recently introduced in the Camaro.

So, what does all this mean? As I type this, Corvette enthusiasts around the world are scratching their heads asking the same question. The 2018 production run may be the shortest since the 6,970 units produced in 1959. Or possibly the 9,752 1997 C5's produced due to a delayed introduction.

Obvious speculation is that GM is prepping for the introduction of the ZR1 and the mid-engine C8 (more on that below). Other speculation is that the 2019's will roll out of the new paint facility in Bowling Green. A handful of 2018's will come from the same facility, but the paint finish improvements are expected to be so good maybe GM didn't want two '18's sitting next to each other, one with orange peel and one without. Although, that would provide some lively discussion on forums and at car shows. "My 2018 is better than yours!"

Pricing should be interesting. Will GM raise the price on the 2019's? If so, how do they justify an increase if identical to the '18's? Will there be GM and Dealer incentives offered on the '18's to clear inventory? Whenever you order a car towards the end of the model year production run, you risk the same car being thousands of dollars less a few months later when the dealers want to clear out the old. Buyers with '18's on order in October weren't thinking that. We imagine a few of 'em are pissed.

#### What We Know about the ZR1 and C8

Here is what we KNOW about the ZR1 and the C8, as of this writing. Remember, you heard it here. We Don't Know when. Some speculation is the C8 is ready now and that GM is changing the whole model year thing to get it out ASAP.

We Don't Know anything about the engine/power train.

We Don't Know pricing. Which leads to...

We Don't Know if the mid-engine C8 will be priced so high that GM will offer an "entry" level C7-like front engine alternative.

Basically, we don't know squat!

### TIRE ALIGNMENT

I found this information and wanted to share it with Corvette Club members. By changing the alignment camber to less aggressive settings as shown in this article, we can get much better tire mileage. I did the dual several years ago and get great mileage from my Michelin tires.

It's a common issue I have run into doing alignments for the last 17 years. The GS and Z06 are set with a considerable amount of negative camber. These cars were designed to be driven hard through corners. When you buy one and drive it normally daily, you end up with tire wear. This is because the outsides of the tires don't get scrubbed down from the hard cornering to match the inside wear.

To combat this, I usually recommend those daily drivers use base specs on their GS and Z06.

For example:

2013 GS/Z06

2013 FE4 ( Z06 ) w/ RPO XFH, FE5 ( ZR1 ) w/ RPO XFH

front

camber - 1.30\* +/- 0.60\*

caster - 7.20\* +/- 0.60\*

total toe - 0.10\* +/- 0.20\*

rear

camber -1.30\* +/- 0.60\*

total toe - 0.00\* + /- 0.20\*

That's a considerable amount of negative camber for daily use.

2013 FE1/FE2, FE3 w/o RPO XFA/XFG

front

camber - 0.45\* +/- 0.60\*

caster - 7.50\* +/- 0.60\*

total toe - 0.10\* +/- 0.20\*

rear

camber - 0.45\* +/- 0.60\*

total toe - 0.00\* + / - 0.20\*

You can see the huge difference in negative camber. so it matters what your intended purpose is in driving the car will make on tire wear.

Thus fortified, we proceeded on a guided tour of farming techniques—

Can you guess what the day's most frequently asked guestion was?...

Yep — "What is the difference between Virgin and Extra Virgin olive oil?"

We started asking it in the field, continued our pestering at the milling wheel, and kept after our guide here in the blending room until she answered it... Answer: The batch of olives used to produce Extra Virgin oil has zero defects, whereas the olives of Virgin oil may have a few defects.



#### THUMBNAIL BOOK REVIEWS



Before the Fall by Noah Hawley. I just finished reading this book. Wow! What a story! The premise is the crash of a private luxury jet plane into the Atlantic Ocean off Martha's Vineyard, from which the only survivors are a 40-something man and a 4-year-old boy. The man is a life-long swimmer and he manages to swim to shore with the boy on his back and a dislocated shoulder. He's almost 30 miles offshore and the effort is tremendous and takes many hours, but through sheer determination and grit, he makes it. The novel then explores each of the passengers on the plane, and describes the efforts made to recover the aircraft and the black box to find out why the plane went down approximately 18 minutes after takeoff without a mayday call or any indication of malfunction. It includes an interesting look at today's news media and its reporting tactics. Once into this book, you will not wish to put it down till you find out what the heck happened.

A Column of Fire by Ken Follett. The third novel set in the fictional city of Kingsbridge from the mid-1500's to the early 1600's, continues the saga begun with The Pillars of the Earth and World Without End, two of his earlier works. Elizabeth I becomes queen of England amid political turmoil and religious debate between Protestants and Catholics. Though this is a huge book (909 pages to be exact), and thus difficult to read in bed without a crane to hold it up, it is a compelling story about what was considered at that time the radical notion of religious tolerance. Follett has an intensely readable style and his descriptions of the more dramatic interludes during the period covered by this novel include the St. Bartholomew's Day Massacre of 1572 (where Parisian Catholics murdered thousands of Huguenots (French Protestants), the execution of Mary, Queen of Scots, and the miraculous defeat of the Spanish Armada by a much smaller force led by Sir Francis Drake.
















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
