## From Member Rollie Trayte:

Corvette has a fairly unique tire pressure sensor that displays tire pressures, and any associated problems, on the driver information center on the dash. These sensors are associated with their respective corners of the car. If wheels are ever replaced or

swapped, the owner has to be careful to put each wheel back on the corner it came from, or he/she will need to reprogram the sensor to the car.

If you don't have the tool, which costs a couple hundred dollars, most Chevy dealerships will do it, but probably not for free.

I recently purchased the Bartec Tire Tool, and will gladly make it available to our membership for a reasonable fee generally, one Corona with lime at an SCC meeting.

# THE SCOTTSDALE CORVETTE CLUB AND WHAT IT'S MEANT TO US

## A CONVERSATION WITH JOHN & JANE RUNYON

We caught John and Jane Runyon at home. John had just returned from a round of golf. They are living in a temporary home while they work on building their new home in Desert Mountain. Their new home will hopefully be ready for occupancy approximately a year from now.

John introduced the subject of the Club and what it has meant to him and Jane personally. Jane said they have met some lovely people and made good friends. The Club has opened their horizons, and caused them to go places and see parts of Arizona they never would have known about or gone to on their own. For example, said John, "we never would have stopped at the Nut House" on I-10, where the Club stopped a number of times for a break on trips to Southern Arizo-The Mystery Castle on South Mountain was another place they cited as a place they never would have gone on their own. "The Club has made us more adventurous," said John. The trip down the Coronado Trail was also mentioned - "We never would have gone there," but they had a great time on that trip.



John said the social aspects of the Club are paramount and have led to the expansion of their social life beyond the Club's activities as they have become good friends with many of the members of the Club. One of their pleasures in the Club is finding that they have many things in common with others that are not necessarily Corvette related. "The Corvette is the vehicle that gets us to the social interaction," says John.

At one of the early dinners he and Jane attended at Roy's, Steve, Lon and Dick got John in a corner and told him they were going to ride their motorcycles next week. John said, "If you guys are really going to ride, I am going to get a Harley." A number of Club members ride together fairly regularly, and have been on several bike trips together. John says, "That's another benefit of the Club for me. I never would have gotten back to doing something that I love to do if not for the Corvette Club."

Dick Kulczycki recruited John for membership in the Club. Dick saw John's Corvette parked at one of the Desert Mountain golf courses where Dick is a ranger and left his card on the windshield with a note to call him about the Corvette Club. John was intrigued and wanted to call Dick but before he could do it, he lost the card. He searched the internet for local Corvette clubs and sent an email to Hugh Anderson, who was then president of the Club, saying he had lost the card of a guy from Michigan with a long Slavic name who belonged to a Corvette Club in the Scottsdale area and asking for help in locating him. Hugh wrote back, "You must mean Dick Kulczycki."

John went to his first Club meeting at the Hyatt Gainey Ranch, wearing a sport coat and leaving Jane at home. He thought he would dress the part since the meeting was at a high class resort, and he thought it was going to be a "guy thing." He got there and everyone was dressed casually and there were all these women there. Everyone said, "Where's your wife?" John won an entertainment book in the raffle at that first meeting. He found the group very friendly and outgoing, and the next month Jane came with him to the meeting.


Jane and John met Walter and Michele for the first time at the Club outing to the Sonic Drive-in Restaurant and the outdoor movie. The four, with their commonality of interests with overseas living and experiences, have become fast friends and socialize together outside the Club.

John and Jane say that from their viewpoint some of the strong points of the Club are: The members are genuine and outgoing and make people feel welcome, which was a good experience for them as recent transplants to the Valley of the Sun; and the women have activities outside of the Club, as well as the monthly Vette Vixens dinners.

John and Jane became active in the Club right after joining. Because they felt so welcome, they wanted to

actively participate. John said the "Standin' on the Corner in Winslow, Arizona trip" was one he and Jane would never have made if not for SCC. While in Winslow, everyone met in Carolyn's room for drinks before dinner, and Hugh, Carolyn, Mark and Chuck "leaned on" John about getting on the Board. When he asked what was involved, they assured him it was "not heavy lifting," and explained how once you are elected to the Board, you gravitate to a position that fits your interests. John says he decided to run and has never looked back. "It forces you to learn about the Club and the values of the Club," he said. This was another step toward getting involved with the Club. As John said, "The best experiences in my life were when I put myself out and got involved."

At the time they joined the Club, the Runyons had a 2002 red convertible. About a month after joining, they got a 2004 red convertible. John said, "All my Corvettes are red." Jane reminded him that the first one was black. Oh, yes, said John, it was black-on-black-on black - a 1998 convertible. And he'll never have another black one. It was impossible to keep the dust off - keeping it clean "drove me nuts!" He had always wanted a Corvette, but being 6'5" he didn't fit in the older models very well. He had just sold his business when the first of the C5's, the 1998, came out, so he and Jane acquired their first Corvette.



John said he had to get an automatic transmission in the '98 so that his kids could drive it. Their oldest daughter, Vickie, who was 21 at the time, thought it was great to drive with the top down. When they first moved to Arizona, they left the '02 red convertible in

Editor's Note: On the following four pages is a "reprint" of Doc's description of the rebirth of ANN from the Cowtown Vettes website, along with some pictures from the story on the website.

### My 1962 Almond Beige Corvette (The first 32 years)

Many of you remember when I did a frame-on restoration of my '62 back in 1999. She was red when I bought her in San Antonio in 1973 and when she revealed her original color of almond beige in 1999 that was the beginning of a lot of car shows. Only 820 of the 14,531 corvettes produced in 1962 were almond beige exterior and fawn beige interior. received an NCRS "Top Flight" award that year and many, many other awards along the way. She was sold after 32 years, at the 2005 Fort Worth Rod & Custom Car Show. Crazy you say? Perhaps. Even though I didn't fit comfortably in the cockpit (I'm normal size at 6' 4" - the cockpit is small) I had perfected a technique during those 32 years where it just seemed the easiest for me to get in, drive, and then get out. But all C-1 ragtops leaked, did not have a/c, p/s, p/b, p/w, stereo, etc., etc., (and it rode like my Father's 1953 Chevy pickup)!

Before I sold her in 2005 I had seen an article in the Corvette Enthusiast magazine, March 2005, Vol 8, Issue 3, p 38, "Bringing Back The Feeling" that piqued my interest. After the sale I went out and bought a 2003 Anniversary Red convertible (they have a "Shale" interior - very close to the "Fawn Beige" of the 62s). That article had influenced my selection. During the 2005 season I participated in a few low-

speed autocrosses and believe that I have that out of my system now. We called her "ANN" to distinguish her from our other 2003, a Medium Spiral Gray Metallic convertible that we had taken 'Museum' delivery of in 2003. Since both were 2003s we had zero trouble adjusting to which vette we were in! During early 2005 I had placed my name on a "list."


### "ANN" Gets a New Dress Our 1962 Almond Beige Corvette (For the Next 32 Years)?

That list that I had my name on was for a specialized 1962 body manufactured by "Classic Reflection Coachworks" (CRC), to be mounted on our 2003 Anniversary model ("ANN") with shale interior. One can select any color exterior so I choose almond beige and the shale interior was

almost a perfect match to the original fawn beige -- so we ended up with a duplicate '62 almond beige exterior and the insides of the 2003 ANN (color, modern technology, safety, & creature comforts) -- the best of both worlds! See the CRC site at: http://www.crcoachworks.com/.

I dropped ANN off in Lakewood, WA on 30 Dec 2005 for the transformation. A few days later, she had been stripped of her C5 skin and being prepped for the '62 skin. On May 2nd, 2006 I picked her up with her new skin where she will




# It's Autumn! Why Not Read a Book?

Such is the book by Irene Nemirovsky called "Suite Francaise." It is, unfortunately, an unfinished piece of work as Irene started to write this book at the beginning of the second World War and was sent to Auschwitz before she could complete it. It was meant to be written in five parts but she managed only the first two, leaving a few notes on how she planned to continue the story. Carried around Europe by one of her daughters, the manuscript, thought to be a diary for many years, was finally published sixty-four years after her death.

The first part of the story revolves around a group of Parisians as they frantically pack their houses to avoid the coming Nazi invasion and the



second moves to a village in rural France and tells how a small village copes with a division of the German army billeted there for an unknown length of time. She is an astute writer and nails the characters brilliantly.

There are copious notes at the end of the book. Do not skip over them as they give more insight into what Irene was thinking as she was writing this masterpiece. There is also a biography of her life.

Go and buy, beg, borrow or steal this book. You won't be disappointed and hopefully will understand a little bit more about WWII and human nature when faced with a threat to everyday life.

### THE RONDINE CORVETTE



Here's one good reason we'll all want to attend the Barrett-Jackson auction in Scottsdale on January 12-20, 2008: one of the cars being auctioned will be the one-of-a-kind Rondine Corvette, hand-built by Pininfarina, the Italian coachbuilder, for the 1963 Paris Motorshow.



At a time when many manufacturers switched to a unitary chassis construction, the fiber-glass-bodied Corvette was a popular subject for Europe's coachbuilders. Pininfarina was one of them and at the 1963 Paris Motorshow they launched the steel-bodied Rondine Coupe. Based off the recently introduced C2 chassis, the Rondine sports a very elegant shape of which various cues were later found on the Fiat 124 Spyder.


