



Hope everyone had a happy and safe holiday season. We enter the year with 125 members and a great Calendar of Events for 2018. The Board met in early December and elected Manny Siprut as Vice President, Frank Tasnadi as Governor, Ed Luse Membership, Rick Cartel Secretary, John McClelland Activities, Brenda Brandt Treasurer, and I will **serve** one more year as President. Walter Juessen has retired from the Board, and we will have a special salute for Walter and Michele in March, so please mark your calendars for March 14th (our March monthly meeting date) which should be nothing short of hilarious!

Our Holiday Party and Toy Run had 51 people attending the Toy Run and 49 attended the dinner party, which was held at Moon Valley Country Club. The food was ok, the entertainment was better, and we had the busiest dance floor in years! Next year the Holiday Party will return to Scottsdale and take place at Grayhawk Golf Club on Sunday, December 9. January activities include our Monthly Meeting on January 10, and our speaker will be Bob Bogdan from Smart Shield. On January 28, we will have the Frank Lloyd Wright experience led by the McClellands, and I will be hosting the Mystery Tour on February 3. Attendance at the Mystery Tour is "unlimited," and I have a restaurant opening especially for our group, so please plan to attend this special event. Our February (14) Monthly Meeting, as is our custom, will be held at our sponsor's location, Van Chevrolet. And on February 24, we will have another house party hosted by the Rabin's, which will be limited to 50 members.

The Vixens have adopted the Men's Poker formula of having people sign up to host or take charge of each monthly event. Krysha Sorce is spearheading the Vixen's event on January 17, and Fran Harder will take the lead for the February 21st event. January and February Men's Poker will be held at the homes of Walter Juessen and Manny Siprut, respectively.

One more comment about Activities. We believe we have an outstanding Calendar of Events, but some of these events are "limited" because of either a lack of hotel rooms available, limited size of restaurants, or the venue itself. For example, many of our House parties are limited to 40-50 because of the work involved and what someone's home can reasonably accommodate. I mention this because we know that some people would like to participate in an event but find that it has quickly sold out, even on the first day! That attests to the attractiveness of the event and the great participation level of our Club members. I hope everyone realizes that we cannot select events where we can accommodate ALL members of the Club. When we have trips where 25-30 can participate, which represents more than 20% of the Club, that is an extraordinary participation level unmatched by any other car club. John McClelland has done an incredible job of trying to accommodate folks who were not the first to sign up for an event by creating a waiting list and accommodating most of those on that list through expanding lodging and restaurant capacity, as well as the inevitable cancellations from those who did sign up and then cannot attend. With this process, only a very few people have not been able to be accommodated. So far we have accommodated 75 members (60% of the Club membership) in the two announced 2018 trips to date, a remarkable result! If you sign up for the Waiting List and give us some time, we may likely be able to accommodate you for that event. We also have lots of other events from which you can choose to participate. We appreciate your support and understanding as we try to deliver a wide range of Activities for our entire membership. If anyone has any ideas on how we can improve the process, please let me or John McClelland know. Hope to see you at one of our upcoming events.


Hola! It's Suzy and I'm here to tell you all about our FABULOUS trip organized by John and Linda McClelland. Since my hubby Charles and I only moved from the San Francisco Bay Area of California a year ago, every restaurant, museum, and experience is new to us, like tourists we are, and we just had a blast! (pun intended)

Our adventure started with brunch in Tempe at Salut Kitchen Bar. The McClellands had pre-arranged reserved front-row parking for us, and we had two long high tables on the patio for our group. The food was YUMMY, so if you want to try somewhere new to you, I suggest this one. And John and Linda called this 'lunch' on the schedule, but, honestly, a lot of us ordered breakfast food. So, note to trip leaders, this group likes our breakfast food!





Then off we went on our two hour drive to the Titan Missile Museum near Tucson. I am not sure entirely how many Corvettes we had, maybe 14?, but it was great. John & Linda in the lead, Frank mid-pack, and the Osters sweeping us all along. It was our first drive of such length staying in formation, so, you know, it was like we were practicing to be USAF Thunderbirds before we even got to the air stuff! (Except we were driving really slow, because this was a safety corridor and we didn't want to get a ticket...or 14 of them. HA!) Interesting for us also to see how the radios worked. The cars were so spread out that the sweeper couldn't hear the leader and someone mid-pack had to relay the instructions.







As we arrived at the Titan Museum, we had a few minutes to look thru the displays, and then our private tour began. First, we all watched a very educational 14 minute or so video about the Titan Missiles and the cold war and how everything worked, and then we set off to the underground.

After 55 steps down, our guide stopped us in multiple locations underground to explain technology, history and procedures. And, lucky me, I got to sit in the Captain's chair when we were in the command room and 'turn the key' to launch the missile simulation! I'm so lucky. Captain Suzy for fifteen minutes!





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After we got lots of education in the control room, we got to look at the missile itself from underground windows, and then we went back up into the land and got great views looking down at the missile from the outside.



People then toured the topside things like the engine display, the museum inside, and the gift shop at their leisure, and we were off to the nearby hotel for the night.

We all did a quick check in at the Best Western Green Valley Inn, and shortly after we met up in a conference room at the hotel to listen to an informative talk by John McClelland. I'm still not quite sure what secret rocket scientist stuff John did in his 'day job' before he retired, but I loved hearing everything he told us and could have listened to him talk longer about the Command and Control movie stuff and nuclear history.

John let us know at dinner that if we wanted to eat as a group in the morning, there as a 7:30 a.m. reservation made for our group in the 19th Hole restaurant at the hotel. The breakfast was complimentary with the hotel, so not huge, but not continental either, and it hit the spot. Again, chatting with other SCC members was fun, and we were away from the hotel and checked out by 9 a.m. Sunday.



We had a scenic 30-minute drive from Green Valley to the Pima Air & Space Museum, where, again, we had reserved parking waiting, plus our own guide, Randy, and our own open-air tram shuttle. John had worked a whole year with Randy planning what things we were specifically to see. The emphasis was to be on the nuclear-capable bombers to keep with our theme, even though we got to see tons of other stuff. It was an absolutely awesome tour again. Randy was just so knowledgeable, and we got to stop and get off our tram and walk around and touch multiple planes that normal tour folks don't get to.




An SR-71 Blackbird

Many thanks to John and Linda for all their time and efforts in planning this trip. It was very obvious that this was John's forte, and his background knowledge really enhanced every part of the trip.




We spent a lot of time learning about this bomber, as the 'theme' of our weekend was nuclear bombs, after spending the first day at the Titan II missile site.

AN INTERVIEW WITH WALTER AND MICHELE JUESSEN

On Wednesday evening, February 7th (2007), Jim and I went to Walter and Michele Juessen's home. It was a balmy winter day in Phoenix, and we sat comfortably on the Juessens' patio, asking questions of Walter and Michele for this article.

As most of you know, Walter and Michele are an international couple - Walter was born and grew up in Romania and Hungary, which were socialist states in Eastern Europe, and Michele was born and raised in Switzerland. Walter was in hotel management and traveled extensively throughout the world, when he met Michele and her family in Switzerland. Walter went to work in Michele's family's sporting goods business, and Michele's father jokingly said Walter had gone "from hotel executive to shoe salesman." He and Michele have been married for thirty-two years.



In the 1970's while the Cold War was still going on, Walter's mother became interested in investing in other countries so that the family would have a place to live if the need arose. In 1979 as they were traveling from Hong Kong to Mexico, they decided to stop in Las Vegas for a short visit. 

Our First Ethnic Epicurean Experience

TAWOOK MEDITERRANEAN CUISINE

If you had been at Tawook Mediterranean Cuisine at Hayden and Via de Ventura in Scottsdale on Saturday evening, March 31, [2007] you would know that it is possible to squeeze sixteen people into an 8' x 10' room for dinner. It was close quarters and noisy, but we had a great time, eating and drinking and chatting with our friends. And every half hour or so a charming, red-headed, scantily dressed belly dancer came by to entertain us with her dancing and undulations. There was no room for her to get very far into the room - no dancing around the tables here! - but she managed to entertain nevertheless.

The cuisine at Tawook is from Lebanon, specifically Beirut. The entrees are served with a choice of house salad or soup and Turkish coffee. Some of us ordered the tabbouli salad for an extra charge - a delicious finely chopped mixture of parsley, tomatoes, scallions, cracked wheat, olive oil and lemon. Others ordered Caesar salad. The entrees at our table were varied, several different lamb dishes: hummus with shawarma (chopped lamb over hummus), shawarma plate (marinated slow roasted lamb with hummus and garlic sauce) and lamb chops (3 deliciously grilled lamb chops served with herb buttered pearl cous-cous); cedar-planked cumin-scented salmon with rice and spices; shish Tawook (a shish-kabob of marinated chicken breast char-grilled with onions and tomatoes over rice and lemon oregano sauce); and marinated sautéed shrimp over rice with garlic sauce. Everyone exclaimed over the good food, and we finished up with a tiny thimble-sized cup of Turkish coffee, very strong laced with cinnamon and cardamom.

Before the evening was over, the chef came in and said hello and took a well deserved bow.

It was a fun experience, and we all tried dishes we had never tried. We certainly wish Tawook every success, as they certainly put out a quality dining product. Kudos to Walter for thinking up this unique experience!

Walter is already putting together ideas for the second quarterly Ethnic Epicurean Experience. I, for one, am heartily looking forward to it!

THUMBNAIL BOOK REVIEWS

This will be a slight departure from the usual Thumbnail Reviews because, unwittingly, I discovered an author who has written a series of romance novels entitled "A Love Story" series. An ad on the internet for a book called *Brew* caught my interest, and I ordered it on my Kindle. I didn't even know it was the latest in the "A Love Story" series. I loved the book – it grabbed me and I finished it in a couple of days. On reading about the author, Tracy Ewens, at the end of the book I found that she lives in the desert with her husband and three children in New River, Arizona – small world isn't it?

Brew by Tracy Ewens. The ninth novel in the "A Love Story" series is about three brothers who own the Foghorn Brewery in Oregon. One of the brothers (Boyd McNaughton) is the brewmaster, single father of Mason. Boyd injures his hand and he and Mason go to the emergency room where Ella Walters is the doctor. It's a charming story in which teenage son, Mason, seeking a woman's point of view in his male-dominated world, develops a friendship with Dr. Ella and slyly manipulates a relationship between Boyd and Ella.

Exposure by Tracy Ewens. The eighth novel in the "A Love Story" series is about a photographer, Meg Jeffries, who takes photographs of wild animals in their natural habitat and has had photo features in National Geographic. A series of publicity appearances is scheduled for Meg to promote her photographic successes, and a well known movie star, Westin Drake, is to appear with her. You guessed it - it's the start of a romance, causing the paparazzi to make Meg's life as complicated as Drake's.

Taste by Tracy Ewens. This is the third novel in the "A Love Story" series and it's about a chef, Logan Rye, and a U.S. Senator's daughter, Kara Malendar, who met at Le Cordon Bleu culinary school in Paris, where they had an amorous affair until Kara was summoned home to Los Angeles without notice at her prominent family's behest. They meet up again years later - Kara now a food critic for *The Los Angeles Times*, and Logan, the owner of a new farm-to-table restaurant in Los Angeles, The Yard. When Kara shows up at the Yard to do a feature article, she and Logan discover that they are still in love, and the story is how they sort out their dysfunctional family relationships in order to be together.

Okay, so now I'm going to tell you that I'm planning to read the other books in the series, including the new one that comes out in January 2018, *Smooth*.


So, if you're interested in the series and want to start at the beginning, though I can tell you they are readable in any order, here's a listing of the series from numbers 1 through 10: (1) Premiere; (2) Candidate; (3) Taste; (4) Reserved; (5) Stirred; (6) Vacancy; (7) Playbook; (8) Exposure; (9) Brew; and (10) Smooth.

Now, if you wish I would get more serious about reading, I have another suggestion for you this issue. Turn the page for more information in an interesting biographical discussion that I am enjoying and you may find interesting. Sisters in Law: How Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg Went to the Supreme Court and Changed the World by Linda Hirshman. If you are interested in the Supreme Court, women's history or both, this book will entertain as well as inform you. These two women are from vastly different backgrounds: O'Connor from an isolated cattle ranch in Arizona and Ginsburg from the hustle and sophistication of the big city, New York. They are also physically at odds with each other: O'Connor, large, blond, open-faced, cheerful and energetic, against Ginsburg, petite, dark-haired, and serious. Both received superb educations, married and bore children early, and tried to make their way in a man's world. Their different paths to the Court are interesting - Ginsburg as a lawyer for the ACLU, a college professor, and a justice on the D.C. Circuit of the U.S. Court of Appeals; O'Connor as an elected legislator in Arizona, a local county judge, then appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals, and finally to the Ninth Circuit of the U.S. Court of Appeals. The question the book seeks to answer is how much effect these two women had on the role of women in this country, or whether the "liberation" of women we have experienced would have happened anyway. I found this to be an interesting and informative read.

A LITTLE HISTORY OF YARNELL HILL, ONE OF OUR FAVORITE CORVETTE ROADS! BET YOU DIDN'T KNOW THIS...


A New Year's Eve storm in the early 1930's stranded many motorists at Desert View, a curve in the then-doublelane road up and down Yarnell Hill where a gas station was located. The storm had deposited three feet of snow in just a few hours, and those going up couldn't get past Desert View or have room to turn around.

A little background includes the following:

- In the early 1900's, Phoenix folks had to go 72 miles by way of the Brill's Tank (now the Hassayampa River Preserve) through Wickenburg, over the Hassayampa, through Octave and Stanton and up to Yarnell to visit Prescott and points north. With the arrival of the automobile, the same trip became 140 miles because the road then went through Wickenburg, Congress Junction, Date Creek, Hillside and Kirkland to get to Yarnell and the ranching community of Peeples Valley.
- In 1926, the Yarnell Hill road was built ... a winding two lanes up Arizona's "Mont Blanc," which climbed 2,000 feet in four miles. It was paved in 1933.
- The other misplaced cargo: Terrified motorists and inexperienced truckers all have tales to tell of making the trip. White Elephant curve was the site of the majority of accidents.
- A cattle truck driver once lost his brakes but managed to save his new tractor by dragging the trailer side against the hillside. Another time, residents salvaged shoes that had been disgorged down the mountain from an accident, but they seldom found a matching pair. As for a load of whiskey, the feds arrived to guard it from thirsty locals. And some recall a load of eggs that survived to be sold by some for 25 cents a dozen, and eaten for a long time by many.
- The Desert View (now an outlook) was first used as a mule corral. After the gas station was added, frantic motorists would stop to find out what was wrong with their cooling systems. Model T's would often burn out the front bearing that received no oil during the steep uphill climb. The mechanic got so he could change them in 50 minutes.

Now, back to the snowy New Year's Eve at Desert View when two buses, one headed up and one down, were stranded, parked nose to nose, unable to go anywhere. The station owner sheltered many travelers in the station and took others to his nearby home. "They ate us out of just about everything we had," he recalled.

In the early 1970's, three years and \$3 million were spent chiseling out a second road for the Yarnell Hill traffic on U.S. 89. Gone were most of the thrills, chills and panic in welcome exchange for the opportunity to appreciate the breathless vistas of the journey on Arizona 's "Mont Blanc."




