OK, picture this, a 1 hour drive on a smooth twisty road in your Corvette, followed by a fabulous lunch. What could be better. Get your motor running!














DRIVE TO FARGO'S STEAKHOUSE IN PAYSON

BOOK REVIEWS

At first, I didn't want to do this feature thinking that it would simply take too much time. But I do like to read... and I DO like to RECEIVE book recommendations. So, hopefully, this will be a two-way opportunity. I will recommend and briefly review some books, **AND I would love to receive book recommendations and brief reviews from YOU**. Today I am recommending three of the books I have recently read. Oh, and when I say that I "read" a book, I *technically* mean that listened to it. I converted to audiobooks whenever possible several years ago.

The Measure, by Nikki Erlick. Ok, admittedly, this one takes an open mind, and you can't focus too much on implausibility. On an otherwise ordinary morning in early March, every person on Earth age 22 and older wakes up to find a small chest with their name on it waiting just outside their front door. Inside is a smaller box and a note that reads, "The Measure of Your Life Lies Within." Some people hesitate. Others can't resist the mystery. Those who open the box find a single string—each one a different length. Confusion quickly spreads. People turn to social media, news outlets pick up the story, and soon the world is abuzz with speculation. Doctors and scientists begin investigating and, eventually, a startling truth emerges: the length of each string is an accurate reflection of how long that person will live. Short strings correlate with short lives, often ending through illness, accident, or sudden trauma. Long strings? They indicate long life. And in-betweeners fall somewhere in the middle.

So here's the question the book explores: If you could open a box and find out your life's length, would you? And if you did—how would that knowledge change the way you live? What if you were a young short-stringer in love with a long-stringer? Would you stay, knowing your time is limited? Or would you walk away?

This was a recent pick for a book club I am in, and once we got past the strange premise, it sparked some amazing conversation. To kick things off, we handed out envelopes with strings of various lengths inside and pretended they were real. It added a fun, imaginative twist to an evening full of thoughtful (and occasionally hilarious) debate.

<u>The Women</u>, by Kristin Hannah. This novel has already received plenty of attention on major book websites, but it's still well worth recommending. I vividly remember how deeply the Vietnam War permeated life in the 1960s and early '70s—especially the draft lottery, which brought intense anxiety to millions of young American men and their families, including mine.

But this story offers a different perspective. It focuses on the women who voluntarily served in Vietnam as nurses. The main character, Frances "Frankie" McGrath of Coronado, California, is fictional, but Kristin Hannah did extensive research to ground the story in historical truth. Drawing on real accounts from nurses and veterans, she brings to life the often dangerous, traumatic, and transformative experiences these women endured.

One of Kristin Hannah's central goals in this novel is to shed light on the vital, yet often overlooked, contributions of the American women who served in Vietnam—many of whom returned home to indifference or even outright denial. It was common for them to hear, "There were no American women in Vietnam," despite the fact that over 11,000 did serve there. While a few lost their lives, many others worked in makeshift field hospitals, stationed close enough to the front lines to feel the ground shake from explosions. They worked around the clock, triaging the wounded under unimaginable pressure, fighting to save lives in the face of devastating injuries and chaos. Their bravery, compassion, and sacrifice are an essential part of the war's legacy—and this novel does a powerful job of honoring their stories and ensuring they are not forgotten.

<u>Lady Tan's Circle of Women</u>, by Lisa See. I've always loved historical fiction, but this book took me somewhere completely new—15th-century China. It's a time and place I knew little about, and while I was fascinated by everything I learned, it also made me realize just how much I don't know.

Life for women back then was so different, it's hard to imagine. Even women from wealthy families faced strict rules. Foot binding, arranged marriages, and never being allowed to leave the family compound—they often lived their whole lives surrounded by in-laws, following strict traditions and ranked by status. There were eunuchs, concubines, long stretches without their husbands, and very few choices for women.

But the story focuses on Tan Yunxian, a young woman lucky enough to live with a grandmother who was trained in Chinese medicine—a woman ahead of her time. That hidden knowledge gave Yunxian something rare: purpose and some rare independence in a world that offered women very little. Over time, this passion helped her find meaning in her life.

I read that the research for this novel was very detailed, thanks in part to a real Chinese medicine book written in 1511 by the actual, well-known female doctor named Tan Yunxian. Her story was almost lost to history, but her great-nephew reprinted her medical notes, and one copy managed to survive all these years. An American woman named Lorraine Wilcox, who has been teaching East Asian medicine since 1990, taught herself how to translate old Chinese medical texts. Lisa See used Wilcox's translation to help tell Lady Tan's story in her novel.

Reading about all this made me wonder how my hobbies—like pickleball and Mexican Train dominoes—stack up next to Lorraine Wilcox's impressive "Chinese medical translation" accomplishment!
