











After a leisurely dinner, we said our good-byes, as everyone was on their own for the return trip to Phoenix on Sunday. All in all, the trip was "short but sweet."



Death Valley Getaway

"We're going to Death Valley for a long weekend," I told my friends and co-workers. "What for?" they said. "There's nothing there but sand and rocks and dirt, and it's the hottest place on earth!"

For us, this trip was to be different. Normally, we run the back door and Terry Turley, our trusty activities coordinator, leads the pack. However, Terry couldn't make this trip, and we were called upon to lead. You certainly get a different viewpoint from the front.


At the drivers' meeting the rules were laid out, and everyone agreed that that was the way they wanted to make the run. This run was different insofar as it had not been pre-run as most of our trips are. We had our destination in hand and were somewhat familiar with about two-thirds of the route, although it had been a few years since we had driven it.

Promptly at 7:30 a.m. on Friday, March 23, 2001, nine Corvettes transporting seventeen members and one guest departed from Phoenix, Arizona, heading for Death Valley. There were five convertibles and four coupes, the first time

in our many trips over the years that the convertioutnumbered the coupes. Our trek took us up the Black Canyon Freeway to Prescott and then north to Interstate 40 and Kingman where we had lunch and a refueling stop. Then it was on to Las Vegas. In maneuvering the freeway system in Las Vegas, we made a miscue trying to get on Highway 95 and ended up on Main Street in the heart of downtown. "skill" and a lot of luck

(Steve Bidwell in the second car sported a freeway entrance), we got back on track and headed up Highway 95 to Beatty, Nevada, where we had another refueling stop before heading into the Death Valley National Park.

Descending into Death Valley, the feeling was almost ethereal - like we were traveling on Mars or into some territory from science fiction. The white sandy floor and the surrounding rocky mountains create quite a memorable picture. After 500 miles on the road, we arrived at the Furnace Creek Ranch, our lodgings for the weekend, about 4:30 p.m. As we walked up to the registration building, there

was a long line of people waiting outside the front door, and we thought, "Oh, no, that surely can't be the registration line." Dick Kulczycki went to stand in the line, and the rest There was no one waiting at the of us went inside. registration desk. The line outside was campers waiting for shower passes; only 125 are issued each day, so you have to be early in line (morning and night) to get one.





After the long trip we all headed for the bar for cold beer and popcorn and peanuts in the shells, and the Arizona basketball game on TV. Later we had dinner at the Wrangler Steak House just a few steps from our cabins. It was a beautiful balmy evening, and the sky was black and filled with bright stars - the kind of sky you never see in the city. We agreed to meet at 9:00 the next morning to plot our day's sightseeing in Death Valley.


Saturday dawned bright and sunny, and most of us had breakfast at the 49er Café just down the way from our cabins. At 8:45 the only ones we hadn't seen were Hugh Anderson and Jane Chang, so we called their room. They were still in bed!! We split into several groups and set out in different directions. Our group quickly discovered that some of the things we thought we'd look at entailed driving

on dusty, gravel, non-Corvette-compatible roads. So we opted to visit the Ubehebe Crater in the northern part of the Park near Scotty's Castle. The crater is 2,400 feet in diameter and was created a thousand years ago by a huge volcanic eruption. The winds generated in the crater are very strong and blow constantly. The crater walls contain many layers of color and different rocks.

From the crater we drove the short distance to Death Valley Ranch, commonly known as Scotty's Castle, in Grapevine Canyon. This fantastic house was built beginning in 1922 by Albert Johnson, a Chicago tycoon, who began financing Walter (Scotty) Scott's gold mining efforts. When Johnson





went to Death Valley to see his investment, he found that Scotty's efforts were not lucrative, but while there he fell in love with the place and he and his wife decided to build a vacation home in Death Valley. The Castle is filled with the Johnsons' original furnishings, even the rugs, dishes, draperies and paintings. It is a grand mansion built in the Spanish style around a central courtyard. The layout for a gigantic swimming pool that was to be both a diving pool and a wading pool is still in place, but was never completed. Scotty's Castle, in the midst of the dry, salty canyons of Death Valley, is surrounded by lush landscaping. The water source is a natural spring that still runs through the property. The Johnsons maintained a room in the Castle for Scotty, and

and after Johnson's death, Scotty lived in the Castle until he died in the mid-1950s.

After the Castle tour we took a driving tour through the Artist's Drive on the other side of Furnace Creek. This drive is recommended for late afternoon because, as the sun lowers in the sky, it brings out the colors in the mountains and rock outcroppings in this one-way circle drive. The atmospheric conditions must have been perfect, because the colors were beautiful, ranging from mauve, purple, pink, through orange, red, yellow, and blues and greens. It was an absolutely stupendous experience.

As the sun went down and the colors faded away, we stopped at the Furnace Creek Inn for happy hour. The Furnace Creek Inn is an elegant old hotel surrounded by lush gardens. The parking lots are quite rocky and definitely not designed for Corvettes. The Inn's large veranda with tables and umbrellas in the cool of the evening was the perfect spot to relax and watch the mountains fade into the night before heading for dinner.

We reluctantly left the Furnace Creek Inn to meet the rest of our friends at the dining room at Stovepipe Wells Village, a thirty-minute drive in the evening breeze with our tops down.

On Sunday morning we headed for the southern entrance to the Park at Shoshone, which is approximately 100 miles south of the Beatty entrance, and drove down close to the salty, al-

kaline floor of the Valley. At one point we were 290 feet below sea level. It's an uncanny feeling to be driving along the floor of the Valley with the colorful mountains rising all around, some of which are snow-capped.
